Park Commission Report

The Park Commission, by its secretary-treasurer, E. D. Webb, submitted its annual financial report to the city council Monday evening. The following is a synopsis of the report:

In commenting on the report, Councilman E. G. Opperman stated that he thought the money was well spent. The myrtle grove park is now one of the beauty spots of Coquille, both along the street as well as the grove in the rear.

The receipts for the Athletic Park were \$97.80 from the baseball club, and \$21.06 from the high school football team. It is expected to keep the funds received there intact, with the intention of eventually fencing the field and putting it in better condition.

Oregon Heads the List

Oregon will receive \$579,000 in the apportionment of federal forest highway funds for the coming fiscal year as announced by the forest service.

Washington's share will be \$325,000 and Idaho, \$509,000.

In the division of the forest road development fund for roads in and adjacent to national forests and necessary to development of their resources, Oregon has been allotted \$537,000, more than any other state except Idaho, whose fund will be \$636,000.

Under this heading Washington receives \$277,000.

Death of Former Coquille Girl

The Cambridge, Minnesota, North Star says:

The community was sadly grieved to learn of the death of one of their young girls just budding into womanhood, when the grim reaper called for this life. Lulu Belle Rice passed from this earth Friday evening, November 26, at the New Asbury hospital in Minneapolis. She was at her untimely death only 18 years, 7 months and 16 days of age, which was due to goitre trouble and a nervous breakdown.

Sugarloaf Creamery Moved

Moving of the Sugarloaf creamery equipment from its old location in the Laird building on Fourth street into its new location, the old Binger Hermann building, now owned by Andrew Christensen, at west end of Spruce street, was completed Sunday, and cheese was made in the new location for the first time Monday morning. Moving the equipment was begun early last week, but because of the fact that cheese must be made every day the plant could be moved only by piecemeal, says the American.

Eighth Grade Examinations

The State 8th grade examination will be held on January 20th and 21st. The examinations in all subjects other than Geography will be the same as usual. The objective type of question will be used in this examination.

The 175 questions in Geography which will be included in this next examination are divided into four classes. The first type of question will be answered by placing the word "true" or "false" before the question, for example: "Most countries lying in the region of the westerly winds have little rainfall." The second type of question is answered by placing the proper word after each question, for example: "The largest river in the United States is ———." The third type of question is answered by placing an X before the proper answer, for example: The Blue mountains are located in —Spain, —Oregon, —Siberia. The fourth type of question is simply the re-arrangement of words and names which are suggested by a given list.

The objective test for state examination purposes is an experiment in Oregon, and, if proven satisfactory to the teacher and pupil, it will no doubt be used in other subjects in the future.

Coos at Head of List

Mrs. Martha Mulkey, county school superintendent, says that Coos county, with its 274 out of 306 teachers belonging to the National Educational Association, is the ranking county in the state in that regard. The county teachers were complimented by Mrs. Susanne Holmes Carter, Jackson county school superintendent and president of the State Teachers Association, at their meeting last month, for the high percentage of N. E. A. memberships in Coos.

Bedingfield to Stay in Bandon

District Attorney J. B. Bedingfield, who had contemplated moving to Marshfield after the first of the year, has decided to remain in Bandon and has opened new and modern offices in the First National bank building. The west front and adjoining rooms on the second floor of the building, vacated by the White Cedar Sales company, have been remodeled and equipped with new furniture throughout.—Western World.
