Advertise Rogue River Bridge

Bids for the construction of a bridge across the Rogue river from Gold Beach to Wedderburn will be called by the state highway commission, probably early this spring, according to reports that have reached Marshfield. Two state engineers have been in the Curry section for the last three weeks working on the project and it is expected that specifications will be ready by the end of the month.

The span will cost approximately \$700,000 and will extend 90 feet into the air so as not to interfere with craft traveling up and down the river. The engineers are working on the approaches at present. Curry county residents are anxiously awaiting the construction of this bridge as the only means of crossing the stream is by ferry.—News.
