W. C. T. U. at Myrtle Point

The W. C. T. U. county institute held in Myrtle Point Wednesday was a pronounced success. The forenoon session opened at 11 a. m. Devotional services were in charge of Rev. Edlund, Swedish Lutheran minister of Marshfield, who gave an instructive discourse on "Service." At noon an enjoyable lunch was served in Rev. C. C. Hulet's home.

The afternoon session opened at 1:30 p. m. in charge of our County President, Mrs. Hulet. The subject of the session, was "Child Welfare." Plans were suggested and discussed for raising funds for the Coos County Cottage. Mrs. Hill, of Coquille, boosted for the publication, "Union Signal," stating that each W. C. T. U. member should have same to be able to keep in touch with our national W. C. T. U. work and also the affairs of our nation, as enacted by congress.

Mrs. Ray, of Myrtle Point, spoke on one department of W. C. T. U. work, viz. "Flower Mission." Jennie Cassidy, the founder of the Flower Mission, has been an invalid 22 years or since her youth. She believes in giving flowers now to the living instead of waiting until they die. She ties the bouquets with a white ribbon bow.

A reading by Mrs. Spencer, of Myrtle Point, was much enjoyed. Mrs. Kramer, of North Bend, spoke on, "What do we talk about?" Our talk is either constructive or destructive. Words are the clothes of our thoughts. Safe Conversation Phil. 4:8. No time to indulge in gossip.

Reports of the Essay contest have not yet been received as to the distribution of the prizes. \$185.00 has been received from the contest.

Rev. Mr. McDonald spoke on "Temperance training necessary today." He cited the Jews of old as an example. They taught the law diligently to their children. Parents should give temperance education to their children.

Next on the program was a song followed by round table discussion. Mrs. C. E. Mulkey spoke on "Enthusiasm of the Child." She said the problem was to direct and train and that much help is given by reading good books to be found in our libraries. Mrs. Kramer spoke on "Forming habits, training in thrift." Mrs. Jas. Richmond's subject was "The nervous child." She said it was sometimes hereditary but that moving pictures were very bad for nervous children and advised one never to tell a child he is nervous and not to nag. Mrs. Bernhardt's advice was to teach children thrift and also that a portion of what they have belongs to the Lord.

Old Hotel Burns at Empire

Fire which broke out in the upper story of the old Pioneer Hotel in Empire at noon last Saturday caused the total destruction of this historic building, which was owned jointly by George Jackson, pioneer resident of Empire, and his sister, Mrs. Emma Saunders, who is the first white woman born in Coos county.

Mr. Jackson was living in the hotel alone at this time, as his sister had gone to visit her sons at Big Eddy.

The cause of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed to have been from a defective flue.

Three thousand dollars insurance was carried upon the hotel, which had 39 rooms. There was much furniture in the building, very little of which was saved. This was not insured.

The Pioneer hotel was built in 1876, and was moved on scows to Empire in 1884 from Uter City, on Isthmus Inlet.

Its furniture was of a bygone style to delight the hunter of antiques; walnut wood, with marble tops on dressers and tables. Many of the finest pieces had been sold, but much remained.

The hotel had been closed for more than twenty years, and a peculiar and ironic circumstance is its destruction just now, when Empire is reported on the eve of a big boom. Rumors in the town say there will be 900 people employed there within another year.

Mrs. Saunders' own room, in which she had many valued keepsakes, was on the upper floor, and was locked, so that nothing was saved from it—Times.
