M. P. Typing Contest

Myrtle Point won first place in the County Typing Contest, held at Coos River last Saturday, with an average of 53.80 net words per minute. This entitles them to keep the silver cup which they have won for the three successive years. Marshfield took second with an average of 52.52 net; North Bend, third with 45.80; Coquille fourth with 43.04; Coos River, fifth with 35.70; Powers, sixth with 30.70; Riverton, seventh with 16.50.

The individual awards were as follows:

Senior Division

First: Bernice Houghton, Myrtle Point, 70 words net. Second: William McLennan, Myrtle Point, 63 words net.

Junior Division

First: Marjorie Putnam, North Bend, 52 words net. Second: Vernon Olson, Marshfield, 49 words net.

The following students wrote with the fewest errors in the county: Christine Nagel, Marshfield, 5 errors, 60 words net, senior. Marvin Jane Hawkins, Coquille, 5 errors, 48 words net, junior. William McLennan, Myrtle Point, 5 errors, 63 words net, senior. The latter received the Accuracy Award having more net words than the other two contestants.

Want \$2,273 From Coos

Plans for a campaign to raise \$2,273.70 in Coos Bay Presbytery as its quota in a \$15,000,000 fund being raised nationally to provide pensions for aged and disabled Presbyterian ministers, missionaries and their widows and orphans were announced last week with the appointment of J. A. Wilkinson, North Bend, as chairman for the local drive.

"Now we'll see what the West can do!" is the ringing answer sent back by Pacific Coast Headquarters of the Laymen's Committee of the Presbyterian Church to Will H. Hays, its chairman, who has asked 14 states west of Chicago to do at least half as well as the rest to raise the \$15,000,000 required to put pensions for aged ministers and dependents of the denomination upon a business-like basis. Two-thirds of the total—the largest money-raising effort ever made by the Presbyterians in America—has been secured in the East, and Mr. Hays is looking to the Presbyteries of California, Oregon and Washington to make it possible for him to report to the General Assembly at San Francisco in May, that the big total has been fully raised. The campaign on the Coast opens on April 21 and will close May 10th.
