Application forms for Adjusted Service Certificate loans are now available to World War veterans at any postoffice of Oregon and this Regional District, according to information received by Kenneth L. Cooper, Portland Regional manager of the U. S. Veterans' Bureau from headquarters in Washington, D. C. Loans can be secured upon execution of the war veterans note and proper identification after April 1, 1927.

American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, D. A. V. of W. W., and Red Cross officials as well as postmasters have been authorized and instructed to assist in preparing these loan requests.

"Prospective borrowers are urged that loan requests be examined and mailed to the Regional Office of the Veterans' Bureau, together with the Adjusted Service Certificate, rather than to secure personal contact with the Bureau office," said Mr. Cooper. "Such action will bring more satisfactory and prompt result than a visit to the government office. There is no advantage in personal contact with a Bureau representative, postmasters and service organizations being qualified to assist war veterans in this matter."

Mr. Cooper stated, too, that there should be definite need for the loan before the request is made. If a local bank is willing to make the loan, the Bureau should not be requested to do so.

U. S. Highway Programs

The construction of 26,841 miles of road and the maintenance of 239,847 miles are included in the 1927 State highway programs of 47 states according to reports received by the Bureau of Public Roads, United States Department of Agriculture. The programs also include the construction of a number of large bridges and the reconstruction of roads previously improved. In carrying out the above programs it is expected there will be expended under the supervision of the state highway departments in the 47 states a total of \$648,483,000. In addition to the state expenditures approximate estimates indicate that counties and other lesser subdivisions of Government will expend during the year \$475,000,000.
