Wins First Cottage Essay Prize

Edythe Farr, of this city, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. C. Farr, was awarded first prize in the Coos county cottage essay contest among all the grade pupils of the county, and Margaret Zintz, of North Bend, first prize in the high school division, according to Mrs. Minnie M. Hulet, who was a Coquille visitor Wednesday afternoon. Other winners in the various grades were Freida James, Myrtle Point, sixth grade; Leona A. Paul, Arago, seventh grade; Hazel Kroeger, Myrtle Point, eighth grade.

The larger cups will be awarded to the Coquille and North Bend schools, and since pupils from all the schools made so good a showing, the committee has decided to give a smaller cup to each school which won in the sixth, seventh and eighth grade.

The judging took place at the University of Oregon, and the following rating guide was used: 40 per cent was judged on structure and form, 40 per cent on general content, and 20 per cent on effect.

The awarding of the cups to schools will take place in the near future as each school so plans.

The following is Edythe Farr's prize winning essay:

Why Coos County Should Build a Cottage for the Children's Farm Home.

In the Children's Farm Home, there are five cottages. Each of these cottages have a "Mother," or a kind lady who looks after the children of her cottage as a mother would look after her own children. There are twenty boys or girls in each cottage. "Daddy Webb" is the superintendent who acts like a real father to the children.

Seven Coos county children have asked to be taken in and they took them in, but thirteen children have asked to be taken in but they had to be refused because Coos county hasn't any cottage and there isn't any room for them in the other cottages.

Lane county has just completed a cottage and there will soon be twenty boys in this cottage.

We need a cottage for these twenty children of Coos county because we want our children to be good citizens, and that is what the Children's Farm Home is teaching its children. We want our children to be raised with some religion and we want our children to have education, all of these things the Farm Home teaches.

The school of the Farm Home is a very nice building, and they teach every boy and girl that is old enough to go to school.

The high school prize winning essay by Margaret Zintz follows:

Why Coos County Should Build a Cottage at the Children's Farm Home at Corvallis:

The white man is dying on his feet. Today he rules the world, but tomorrow who will be supreme? Will he always lead in science, art, literature, and government? Will he always command while the others stoop to obey? No, unless he grows, progresses continually in all things, he will fail; he will lose in the struggle for word supremacy. They must look ahead and see what will be the result if they do not prepare their children to lead good, happy lives; to be healthy; and to be interested in making the world a better place to live in.

We, the people of today, face the problem of training and caring for our children so that they will lead successful lives and leave the world better, in some way, than it was when they came. Those little children who have no parents, or whose parents for some reason are unable to give them the advantages in life which others have, especially need our attention and aid. It is our duty to ourselves and to the world to give them an equal chance with the others, to make themselves successful in life, and a benefit to mankind. It is the duty, and it should be the desire, of the people of Coos county to contribute toward educating and developing these little unfortunate boys and girls into good, healthy citizens by giving them as much of parent love and happy home-life as possible. We can help many children by building a cottage at the Children's Farm Home at Corvallis. There the boys and girls are educated and trained, and given home-life and love.

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Notes From Ophir

Ophir, Ore.

Editor Sentinel:—Knowing this country around here to be a favorite hunting ground for Coos county sportsmen and others, I thought a little news from central Curry might be interesting to many of your readers. Hence the following news notes:

Eldon Miller, of Ophir, returned Monday from a three days' hunt on the north fork of Lobster Creek with his two year old bear hounds, "Coalie" and "Sport." He was exceedingly pleased with his luck, having bagged a large male bear about 5 p. m. Sunday after a four-hour chase, baying several times and treeing the second time before fortune gave him a chance for the fatal shot. Sunday was the hottest day of the season, making it bad for the dogs. Also the north fork of Lobster Creek is considered the hardest part

of this country for dogs to stop bear, it being so rough. But few bear have ever been captured that old, trained dogs have chased in there.

Sunday was a wonderful day and evidently enjoyed by all as the beaches and creeks were lined with picnickers and fishing parties. A number of picnic parties were also seen digging clams at the "Devil's Backbone," the north end of Ophir beach. The writer noticed several cars from Coquille.

Traffic on the new Roosevelt highway was heavy throughout the day.
