MANY HOMES SAVED THROUGH AUXILIARY

The disabled service men in the hospitals are paid 1c each for making the poppies for the American Legion Auxiliary, and for many this is the first money earned since the war. No service work accomplished with the poppy profits can excel this service to the disabled, which brings to them the realization that they are again able to take their places among the wage-earning citizens.

To many this is a blessing. There are a large number of uncompensated men in the hospitals and the poppy money is being used to support families, to pay off mortgages, to pay taxes on homes and farms.

One service man whom the Auxiliary helped to get on his feet by loaning him money to pay the taxes and interest on the mortgage on his home, had to leave his family and go to the hospital. His wife returned to her parents with the children while he was away, and all winter he made poppies in his struggle to pay off the mortgage to save his home and have

a place to gather his little family together when he returned.

These are the men and women for whom the poppy program was planned, and many are the minds made easier and the homes made happier because of the Auxiliary program.

Thus the little poppy plays an important part in the Legion and Auxiliary Rehabilitation and Child Welfare program before as well as after the sale. The Coquille Auxiliary will sell poppies on the streets between May 21 and 28, and all poppy funds will be spent on disabled veterans in Oregon. All American Legion poppies will have the Legion sticker on them so that one can tell the genuine service poppies from the commercial ones.
