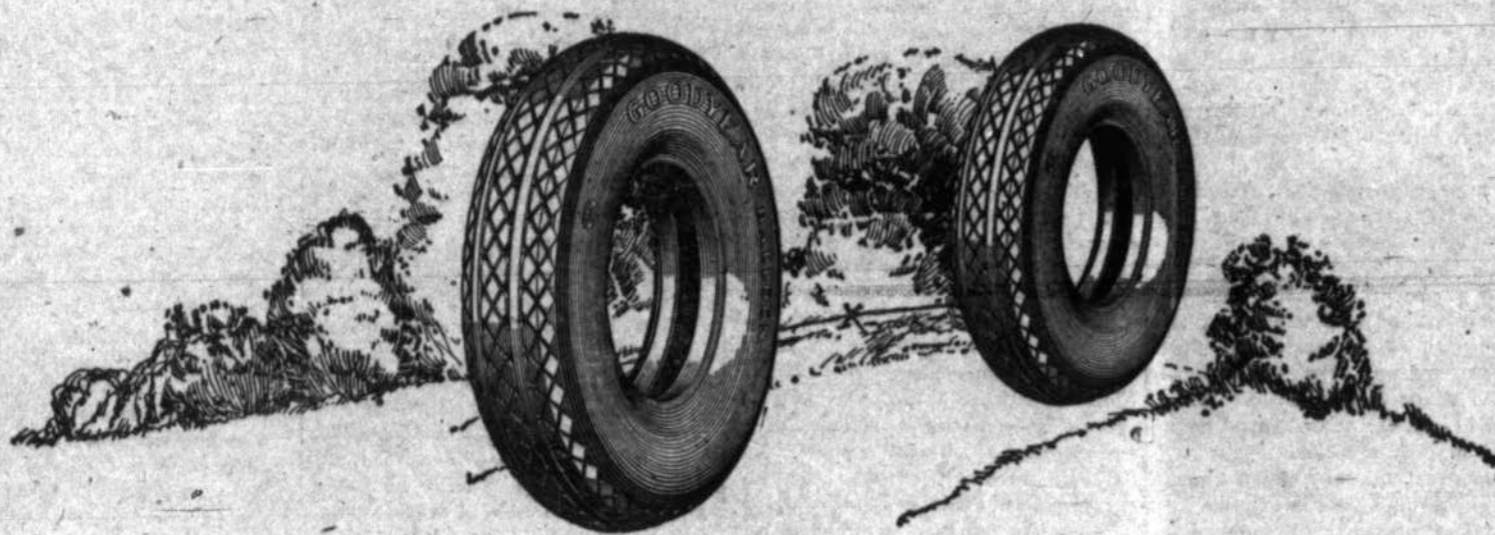

about that kind of work, it appears that Coquille has received a real, high class job in its seventeen blocks of paving put down this summer. All the new street work has been finished and the four feet widening of Second street, from Henry to Beech, will be completed today. All that will remain to do after the Fourth is the laying of sidewalk on both side of Beech, from Third to Fourth, repairing sidewalk breaks, and cleaning up. Some of the paving has been open to traffic this week, before the dirt covering was removed, and it will all be open in about two weeks. There never has been a change in the city which made so vast an improvement in its appearance as does the street paving laid on First street last year and on the other streets this year. When the parkings have all been turned from weed patches to well-kept lawns it will be a most handsome residential district.

**Oil Drilling at Arago**  
Leasing of land in the Arago district by persons connected with an oil concern continues, there being considerable over 1,000 acres under long term lease yesterday. For the second time the well was pumped dry and again the strong odor of oil returned. Mrs. McMullen sent some of the samples of black bubbles that first came into the well after being pumped dry, to the college at Corvallis and on being analyzed it was found to be oil—American. **Fairview School Contract Let**  
Ben F. Leish, of Marshfield, who has built several houses on the Williams' tract in the north part of Coquille during the past year, was last Saturday afternoon awarded the contract for building the new two-room concrete school house at Fairview. His bid was \$8,869.80. The building will have full-concreted basement for play rooms and will be an attractive looking structure. C. L. Willey, of Coquille, was low bidder for the plumbing and heating, and was awarded the contract for \$850. The Bank of Southwestern Oregon bid \$100.75 per \$100 for the \$10,000 worth of bonds which was recently voted for school building purposes, and being high was awarded the issue.
