Letter from Scout Camp

Frog Camp, Scout Camp,
McKenzie Highway, June 24, 1927
Dear Editor: The boys scouts at the Three Sisters scout camp started out to climb the Middle Sister at 3:30 o'clock Wednesday morning, the twenty-second of June.

The ground was all covered with snow and this made hard and slow going. We arrived at the foot of the mountain about 8:30 and at 10:30 we were pretty near the top but were hungry so we stopped for an hour to rest and eat.

As we climbed nearer the top it began to get colder and the wind began to blow harder and made it more difficult climbing. By the time we reached the top the wind was blowing about sixty-five miles an hour. We reached there at 2:10 p. m.

As soon as we reached the top Mr. Britton wrote our names in the book which is left on the top all of the time. We were first to sign up this year.

It didn't take us long to come down as we slid almost all of the way.

When we got back to camp we built fires and had hot supper, then went to bed.

It rained most of the day Thursday and we just stayed around camp but this morning it seems to be clearing off.

We will probably not climb the South Sister as the snow is deep and

Killed by Falling Tree

Mrs. Mary Meyers, of North Bend, was killed Monday evening about 6 o'clock when she was hit by a falling tree which struck her across the hips, breaking her back and legs and crushing her skull.

The accident occurred near Lakeside where Mrs. Meyers has been with her husband who is cutting pulp wood for Bill Clinton.

Her husband, Jack Meyers, her son, Harold Crump, and a son of Mr. Meyers were watching them, was preparing to leave when the tree fell. The tree was about 2 1/2 feet in diameter and it did not fall in the direction expected by the men. The accident happened at six o'clock and Mrs. Meyers was immediately brought to North Bend. She was driven over by a Lakeside man but died when they reached the ferry slip on the Glasgow side which was about 7 o'clock. Dr. Phil Keizer was called and he met them a few miles up the Glasgow road but no coroner's inquest was held.—Times.

Highway Done Soon

Motorists, who have occasion to drive over the Roosevelt highway through Curry county, are glad to learn that it won't be long before the old bridges over Euchre creek, Hunter's creek and Pistol river are soon to be replaced with modern concrete and steel structures, contracts for all three of which have been let by the state highway commission. Work upon the Pistol River bridge has been underway for several weeks by the C. J. Montag company of Portland, and good progress is being made, although it is not expected that the structure will be finished before late summer.

The same company has just been awarded the contract for the Hunters Creek bridge at its bid of \$25,235 and will start work upon the same at once. The Montag company was the lowest bidder upon this same bridge over a year ago, but the commission would not award the contract claiming that the bid was too high. However, the contract just awarded was very close to the same figure at first submitted. This company also built the concrete structure over Myers Creek and over Floras Creek, both in Curry county.

D. P. Plymale, who built considerable of the Roosevelt highway through Coos and Curry counties, as well as some street work in Bandon, which is his home, is to build the bridge across Euchre creek. His contract price is \$7,775.

Both the Euchre creek and the Hunters creek bridges have long been in dilapidated condition, with two or three accidents occurring on the latter.—Times.
