1200 MILE TRIP THROUGH OREGON

ery, and will make this mountain top station one of the most popular on the whole line.

Fishing is good at times in both these lakes—we didn't happen to strike the days when anyone was hooking them. The streams east of the mountains are all high and the tourist who must catch fish to make the trip a success, should wait a few weeks until the snow on the mountains is gone and the rivers and creeks subside. Fishing was not the sine qua non with us.

The highway from Klamath Falls to The Dalles passes through timber unending, with long stretches of roadway, straight as a string. One stretch, on which La Pine is located is probably the longest piece of straight improved highway in the state, being thirteen and one-half miles in length.

South of Bend more logging rads are building and the highway is more open than it is to the south. For many miles south of Bend the big two-wheel logging trucks have cleared the timber but it will be years and years before all the pine in that section is cut.

Bend is a very fine looking city, but there was not the bustle and activity noted at Klamath. We had intended to take the Century Drive from there but found that the northern sector was still under ten feet of snow and gave up the idea of that 100-mile loop.

North of Bend we crossed Crooked River and from that bridge, said to be the highest highway bridge in the world, looked down in that deep canyon, which gives one a faint idea of what the Grand Canyon looks like.

It was in this section, where gorges are frequent that a police dog last week, following its owner's car, evidently thought to cut across lots and come up with the auto, jumped a fence. He landed, smashed to a pulp, one thousand feet below.

While Mackenzie Pass was opened the day before we arrived in Bend, there was still considerable snow and mud, making chains necessary and we gave up the idea of seeing the lava beds at the top of the divide.

The Dalles is a mighty nice-looking town and has more modern buildings than Hood River, farther down the river.

The latter point, we have always known, was a very fine place, but not until a drive is taken 15 or 20 miles to the southwest does the visitor acquire a full realization of what a wonderful berry and apple district it is. Strawberries, apples, peaches, the whole plateau at the foot of Mt. Hood is thickly settled, intensively cultivated, and had the appearance of a very prosperous district.

There is another highway in Oregon which is unsurpassed for simple beauty of stream, hill and trees. That is the Mackenzie River Highway, from Springfield to Lost creek, sixty miles east. The river is a swift, ever changing, beautiful stream, coquetting with the highway as it advances and recedes, but continually luring on to more gorgeous spots of transcendent beauty. It is a trip of which one could never tire.

As we wrote from Ashland, after a three-meal experience with Mr. Norton's cooking, that there would be no lack of well-cooked meals for the trip so we could say on arriving home last Saturday evening. Not more than two lunches or dinners were alike for the whole trip and the number of meals secured in eating houses was just five for the two weeks.

It was a splendid vacation, the best the writer ever enjoyed, and was a real pleasure from beginning to end.
