"Myrtlewood" A New Addition

"Myrtlewood" is the name of the most recently platted sub-division of Coos county, it being the name of the ten-acre tract filed with County Clerk Watson on Wednesday by Oerding Industries, Inc. It is located on the highway, adjoining the J. H. Oerding and S. M. Arnold tracts and consists of 20 lots. Eight of these lots face on Roosevelt street, which intersects the Roosevelt Highway at the southeast corner of the tract and range in size from 70x190 to 70x190 feet.

Back of these are twelve tracts, approximately half an acre each. There are ten feet alleys between lots and Oerding avenue, a 50-foot street, separates the two blocks.

Two homes are now under construction there, one of which is nearly finished. Both will be of stucco, plastered and modern throughout.

A well recently drilled by W. F. Kernin will furnish unlimited water supply for household, irrigation or fire protection.

A building restriction has been placed on the tract which requires that at least \$2500 be expended on any home built there, which insures an excellent, exclusive residential district.

The disposal of the tract has been placed in the hands of Nels Osmundson, of the Bandon Beach Realty Co. here.

Telephone Co. Still Building

Evidence of the growth of southwestern Oregon is seen in the construction by the Coos and Curry Telephone Company of additional circuits between Gold Beach and Bandon to care for the growing long distance business of the company.

A construction crew has just completed installation of a copper metallic circuit between these two points and preparations are now being made for building a new pole lead with a standard construction toll line from Gold Beach across the California boundary, to Crescent City.

An additional circuit is now being strung from Orick to Trinidad, California, the southern boundary of the Coos and Curry Telephone Company territory, which will meet growing demands for service along the Redwood highway.

Addition of these facilities to the investment of the Coos and Curry Telephone Company is part of the \$90,000 expansion program announced early this year by Charles Hall, president, and Earl W. Gates, general superintendent.

Bad Wreck Sunday

Elmer Matson, of Sumner, 42 years of age, was seriously injured on the Bandon highway, near the county line Sunday afternoon about two o'clock, when the automobile he was driving skidded in the gravel and turned over. His head and one side of his face appeared to be crushed and the blood which he lost seemed to indicate that he had been fatally injured, but reports from the hospital at Bandon yesterday were that he was improving. Mrs. Karjola and daughter, also of Sumner, were shaken up but not seriously injured in the accident.

Those who saw the wrecked car, the badly broken steering wheel, etc., cannot understand how a man could live after being in such a wreck.

It is the officers' theory that too much speed was responsible for the accident.

The Jury Disagreed

The jury which heard the case against A. L. Martin, of Marshfield, for driving while intoxicated, in Justice Anderson's court at the Bay Wednesday, disagreed after three hours of deliberation, standing three and three. The case aroused great interest in Marshfield and the trial was very largely attended.

No announcement has been made by the district attorney as to whether he would call for a new trial or dismiss the case.
