The slogan, "Coquille gets the best of everything," is not out of place this week with the arrival of Evangelist Wm. ("Billy") Black, of Los Angeles. Rev. Mr. Black, accompanied by his wife, Mrs. M. L. Black, their two children and Miss Carman Tucker, secretary of the party, arrived in the city yesterday by motor to conduct revival services at the new, Four Square Tabernacle corner of Second and Heath Sts., Rev. Oscar Lewis, pastor.

The Blacks have just concluded a campaign in Klamath Falls at the Klamath temple and are scheduled for Eugene, Portland, Spokane, Bellingham and Vancouver, B. C.

Mr. Black was born and educated in the north of Ireland and is widely known in the evangelistic field, having travelled extensively in the U. S. and Canada during the last seventeen years. TELEPHONE CO. CO-OPERATES WITH FIRE DEPT.

In an effort to eliminate confusion and to aid the Coquille Fire Department, the Coos and Curry Telephone company will discontinue giving information to the general public as to the location of fires.

Effective July 15, according to announcement made today, only fire department members and city officials and employees of the Mt. States Power company will be given this information.

The plan is already in operation in Marshfield and North Bend and has proved highly satisfactory according to fire department officials.

The action was taken in Coquille after the following request had been made by C. W. Gardner, Chief of the Coquille Fire Department, to the Coos and Curry Telephone Company:

It has been my sincere desire as Fire Chief of Coquille to have installed in our local telephone office, a system to relieve the congestion on the switchboard when a fire alarm is sounded.

With dozens of calls coming in simultaneously a few seconds after the alarm is sounded, firemen find it difficult if not impossible to obtain immediate information as to the location of the fire. This condition is a handicap to the firemen, to central and a menace to the safety of public property and the protection of human lives.

Complications arise daily in our business and social structure which necessitate immediate changes to cope with new situations.

So it is with our present call system relative to the dissemination of information to firemen. Central is not to blame, because she cannot tell which phones to answer first—firemen receive no preference.

I look upon this condition as a menace to the public safety and recommend and request that central be instructed not to give anyone except firemen information relative to the location of the fire; also that red lights be placed on the switchboard to indicate firemen's phones and that all of these be answered or called first in case of fire before answering any other calls.

I want to thank your organization for its splendid co-operation in the past in matters pertaining to fire fighting and I hope you will give this matter your immediate attention.

State's Record Cow in Coos

The summary report by N. C. Jamieson, extension dairyman at O. A. C., for all the cow testing associations in the state, received this week by County Agent Harvey S. Hale, shows that Millard Martin, of Coos River, in Melowest No. 2 had the honor high purebred cow in the state for the month of May. She produced 1475 pounds of milk, containing 95.8 pounds of fat.

Ben Monson, also of Melowest No. 2, owned the third highest ranking cow, a grade Jersey, with 2050 pounds of milk, testing 92.3 butterfat.

Tillamook ranked first in number of 40-pound cows, with 1149, and also highest in average pounds of fat at 47.34. Melowest No. 2 was second in the state with 373 cows, averaging 42.4 per cent fat; Melowest No. 1, third, with 380 cows producing 42.1 per cent; Coquille Valley, fourth with 394 cows, averaging 40.08 per cent.

Coos county has 1144 of the 40 pound cows as against Tillamook's 1149, but in total number under test Coos outranks Tillamook, 2184 to 1574.
