

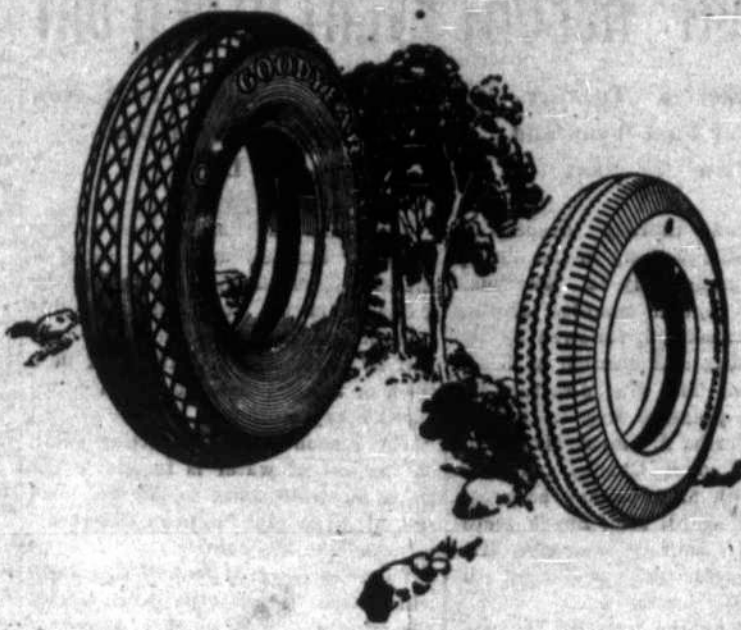

C Club at Ashland Normal

The following letter is from Mrs. Inez R. Chase, who with 40 other Coos county teachers, is attending the Southern Oregon State Normal school at Ashland:

Last Monday morning during the assembly period at the S. O. S. N. S., the Triple C or Coos county group of students put on a stunt depicting the history and natural resources of our county. Forty-one Coos county students are now registered here.

The program was opened with an inspirational history of Coos, original with Mr. Burkhardt, of Bunker Hill, and revealed many facts that had never been known before.

This was followed by an original play staged in a logging camp kitchen, where the cooks, Mrs. Laura Brandon and Mrs. Wanda Wilcox, were preparing a meal almost entirely from foods produced in Coos county with the exception of some "inferior" Hood River apples and an occasional small potato that looked as though it came from Roseburg. The play brought hearty applause from faculty and student body.

At the close the club presented the Normal school with a solid mahogany wing chair of an Italian style, to be placed permanently on the rostrum of the attractive auditorium.

This was well received, most especially by President Churchill. He was requested to come forward and be the first to occupy the chair, which he did smilingly and then with fitting words he thanked the Triple C for the gift and for the spirit of interest and appreciation of the S. O. S. N. S., which prompted them to make it.

Coos Booster at Eureka

Mr. and Mrs. N. W. Woodey, of Eureka, Calif., were here last Friday evening and in conversation with Lyle Compton, at the Hotel Coquille, assured him that Coos county would receive a large percentage of the tourists, now that the Roosevelt Highway is open on the new grade south of Gold Beach. Mr. Woodey is district manager of the California State Motor Association, affiliated with the A. A. A., as is the Oregon association, and the friendly sentiments expressed by him, indicate a closer affiliation between northern California and Coos county than has existed heretofore.

Want Bandon Road Oiled

Resolutions were adopted by the Coquille Chamber of Commerce directors Wednesday evening asking that the Roosevelt Highway, between Coquille, Bandon and Port Orford, be oiled this summer. Even though the road is not ready for a heavy oiling, a sprinkling of light oil would lay the dust and make travel over it more pleasant.

The Bandon directors took similar action Wednesday, and the county court will present the resolutions to the highway commission.

Another matter on which the directors acted was an effort to secure a more truthful report on the Coos Bay-Roseburg highway by Roseburg hotels. Even as long since the oiling as Tuesday of this week a man came over here by stage after being told that the road was not fit for travel. He was considerably wrought up when he found that the highway was in the best condition it had ever been.

The secretary was instructed to write the Chamber of Commerce at Roseburg, asking that body to do what it could to prevent the circulation of such erroneous reports.
