County Agents to Certify Grains

Yearly grain certification by county agents will soon be under way in Oregon fields. Since this college extension work was started through farm crop specialists and county agents in 1918 thousands of acres of grain have been certified.

Certification as conducted by the extension service is the stamp of approval given grain that passes inspection in the field and laboratory. Certainty of germination and freedom from variety mixtures, foreign grains, noxious weed seed and disease are passed upon by a qualified extension representative.

Before grain certification was started as much as 50 per cent of wheat marketed was graded as "mixed" under federal standards. The average for 1918 was 33 per cent. By locating sources of pure varieties best adapted to Oregon conditions and standardizing them the amount graded "mixed" has been brought down to 6 per cent, the percentage sold on the Portland market last year.
