Mrs. Walter Sinclair Is Dead

Word was received by the Sentinel from Walter Sinclair this week that his wife passed away at their home in Los Angeles on July 4th. The funeral was held July 7, interment being in Evergreen Cemetery.

Mrs. Sinclair had been suffering for more than a month and an autopsy showed that she had no possible chance of recovery.

Mr. Sinclair states that he has been under the doctor's care for the past month and is forbidden any effort that involves exercise.

Mrs. Sinclair, who was 70 years of age, was a member of the pioneer Baltimore colony, and a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Stauff. Until her marriage to Walter Sinclair, one of Coquille's leading attorneys in his younger days, she conducted a dress-making establishment in Marshfield. They had no children.

Mrs. Caroline Sinclair was a sincere and devoted member of the Episcopal church here, prominent in social and charitable movements, and her passing is sincerely mourned by her many friends and acquaintances in Coquille and Coos county.

For the past five or six years Mr. and Mrs. Sinclair have made their home with her brother, John Stauff, in Los Angeles.

A Most Complete Wreck

About the worst damaged car ever brought in to Coquille was the Buick coupe, belonging to Jack Clark, of Marshfield, which Fred Koons brought in to the Coast Auto Lines garage early Monday morning.

Mr. Clark and Eugene Grant occupied the car. In making that reverse curve, just this side of the Walter Phule place, they made the first section of the curve, but instead of going around the hill point, across the highway from the barn, the car plunged up the hill and then took a 35-foot nose jump on to the highway, four small holes in the oiled surface showing where it struck. Besides a slight cut and a few minor bruises the men were uninjured, but the car looks like junk. The top was sheared off, down to the body, the wheels on one side were demolished, the radiator, fenders, hood, lamps, bumper, etc., were completely mashed and the steering wheel snapped off.

How two men could have lived through a catastrophe of that kind will forever remain a mystery.

The men say that a speed demon crowded them off the grade, but it hardly seems possible that a car traveling "only 28 miles an hour" could have performed the gymnastics that Buick did.

A lot of bunk has appeared in Bay paper about a fictitious musk rat farm, owned by Dr. G. E. Low and Arthur Ellingson, of this city. It is true the men have been looking at possible locations for such a fur-producing industry, but that is as far as they have ventured.

Last week they went up on the top of Green Spring Mountain, where a musk rat farm was started three years ago, with 100 rats. The owners now estimates that he has 5,000 rats, but it is purely guess work. He has, however, sold enough skins to pay for his initial investment, at up to \$10 or \$12 a pelt.

The shortage of musk rat skins last year ran into the millions and for some years the price should be high but the local men figure that good money can be made at \$2 a pelt, but they have not yet decided to get into that game.

H. H. Davis Dead at Bay

Herbert H. Davis, 69, father of Carl L. Davis, was found dead in his bed at 4:30 o'clock Monday morning by his wife, death due to heart failure. The aged man died peacefully and without speaking, apparently asleep.

Born in Elk River, Minnesota, May 24, 1858, Mr. Davis spent most of his life there. He was affiliated with the C. A. Smith Lumber company for 35 years and in 1916 came west and located in Placerville, California, where he took over the white pine interests of the Smith company.

Mr. Davis is survived by his wife, Mrs. Lucia Davis, two sons, Carl L. Davis, of Marshfield, and Earl R. Davis, of Oakland, two brothers, Charles W. Davis, of Marshfield, and Winthrop Davis, of Pueblo, Colo., and one sister, Mrs. Albert Briere, of Minneapolis.

Funeral services were held Wednesday from Theurwacher's Funeral Home and interment was in Sunset cemetery.—News.
