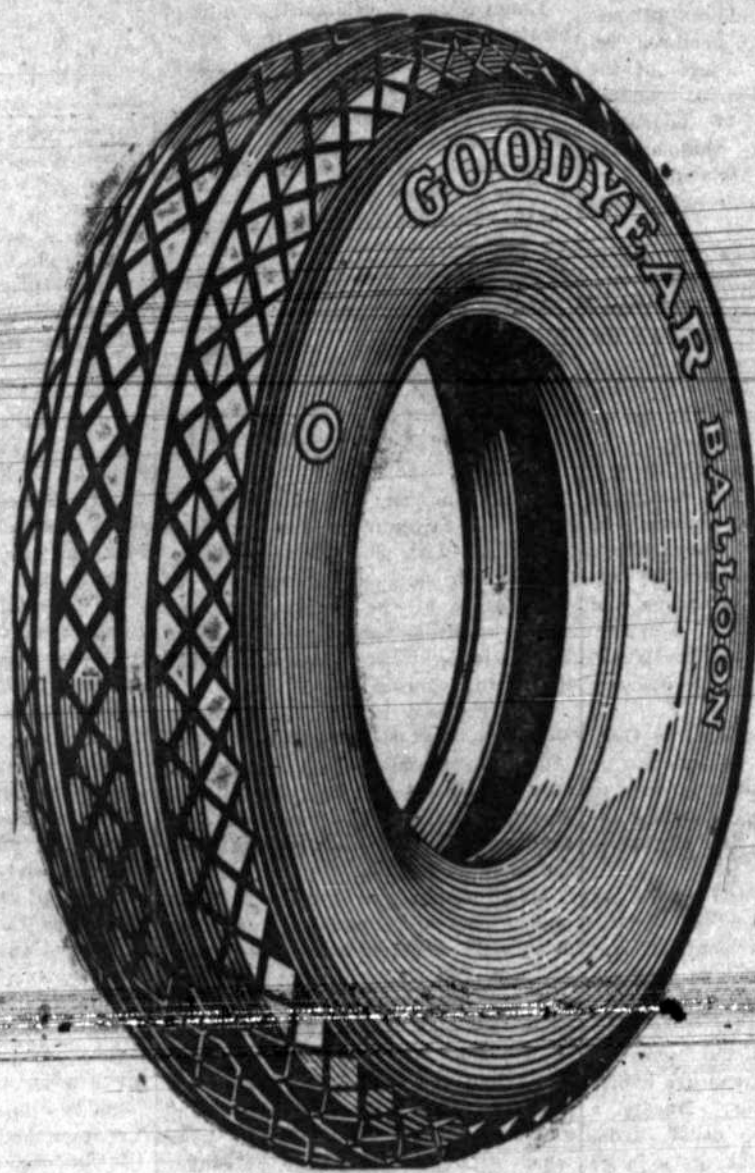

Jennie Beck, 14, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dave Beck, of Riddle, Ore., is lying in the Mast-Wilson hospital in a serious condition as the result of a wreck Saturday afternoon near the Coos-Douglas county line. Medical examination disclosed a broken back with several of the girl's vertebrae badly fractured. At last reports she had been put into a swing and hopes were held for her recovery.

The girl's mother, Mrs. Dave Beck, is also in a bad condition. She is suffering from head injuries and her face is in such condition that features are scarcely recognizable. Mrs. Beck was caught beneath the wreckage of the car. Mr. Beck is suffering from a broken arm but was discharged from the hospital.
