## Coquille Post Wins 2 Trophies

Coquille Post No. 36 of the American Legion has in its possession for the coming year the handsome F. B. Stewart trophy awarded at the state convention in La Grande last week. This silver cup is two feet in height and a very pretty thing. It was awarded the local post for its membership increase record the past year, which showed an increase of 356 per cent over the average of the four preceding years. It was won last year by Vernonia, and must be won three successive times to become the permanent possession of any post in the state.

This post also won, but has not yet received, another cup for showing the greatest increase the past year in the southwestern district. There are seven districts in the state.

The delegates who went from Coquille to La Grande report a very interesting convention, with many excellent addresses, but all of them breathed a sigh of relief when they got back to the cool breezes of the coast.

A report of the convention proceedings will be presented to the local post at its September meeting.

## Jim Davis' "Confession"

Jim Davis, sentenced to 15 years in the penitentiary for arson, wrote the following before his departure for the pen yesterday. He wrote it out himself and gave it to Mrs. Alice Schroeder, in the sheriff's office. Jim has had a good deal of publicity since he came to Coquille several years ago and the following is probably the last he will get:

Will try to clear up doubt among the people as I know I did wrong, but I did it. I set fire to Earl Cochran's barn. I know I will be punished for it. I never did want to deny the charge. I did try to tell the officers in a way, but the officers did not understand me. Every time the officers would talk to me about a lawyer to fight my case I would tell them I would not bother about my case. I wanted to see about by things. I was fifteen months trying to dodge this trouble. I was warned time and again to leave the country through dreams, but I did not obey my dreams and this is the outcome of it. When I went to Mr. Earl Cochran's the first time and counted up my time, me and him set side by side, we agreed to each other, I got my gun that he had been keeping for me and left for town. I met Mrs. Mifch and she gave me a job and she will tell my complaint. When I got to town and got my milk cans I told the hardware man I had money coming, but the man did not have it at the present time, but he was good and would pay it. I went to D. Kay and got some feed, I told him I would give him an order, but he refused to take it. I was in Erdman's meat market and told him I had worked

good since I was working at his place, but I had not got any money but I knew I would get it. For two or three weeks I waited. I dreamed he would not pay me and stay away from his place. I thought I would go down and try to get some of it, but not got in any fuss, so I went down there and asked him, but he refused me and insisted on me to come back and finish up the job. I tried to show him I could not come back, but I could not, but I stuck my hand in my ears and left for home. I never made any threats, for I had been warned in a dream and I was scared. A couple of days after I gave it to my lawyer and when my lawyer told me about the terms I left for revenge.
