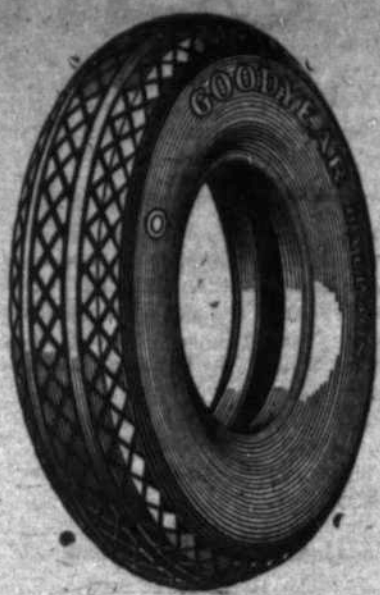

#### Weyerhaeusers at Empire?

In the Coos Bay Harbor last Friday, Edgar McDaniel gives the following latest report on what the activity in Empire means and what large corporation is back of the deal:

There seems no longer any doubt that the buying regime at Empire is supported by the Weyerhaeuser company which has large holdings of timber in the country east of Coos Bay, principally in the Tioga district, where the timber for some years has been reported as commencing to deteriorate.

Some people scout the idea that timber lessens in value through decay, but timbermen who know the woods and have seen the Tioga country will say the timber is in a condition where it should be cut or else the owners will lose a good portion of it.

The news that the Weyerhaeusers are interested in the Empire area came in such a manner it could scarcely be doubted. The big timber to bind the deal, but on the day the Northern Pacific have always worked together and it is almost certain the railroad will be extended this way before long. Of course, nothing is heard of when operations at Empire will commence, but many expect it will be soon.

We also heard Sunday that the backers of the deal are three North Bend men, but there is nothing authentic to that report.

That the interests back of the proposition have plenty of funds cannot be doubted. Lyle Chappelle, of North Bend, told last Friday evening of a woman over there who had given an option on Empire property. Hearing nothing further, she had the idea that she was ahead the amount paid her company and the Great Northern and option expired, she received a check for \$7,000, in full.
