## Still Chance for \$10,000 Prize

Keen interest is being shown by the women of this city and surrounding territory in the great \$50,000 cash prize competition of the laundry owners of the United States and Canada. Mr. A. L. Simpson, owner of the Coquille Laundry, said today.

"Many inquiries as to the details of the contest have been received," Mr. Simpson continued. "We are glad to answer them and to give any assistance in our power to help our women here to win. Visitors are cordially welcome at any time and we shall be glad to show them the plant in operation."

All that is necessary to win the \$10,000 first national prize or one of the other valuable prizes offered is to write a 300 word letter giving the writer's reasons "Why the Laundry Should My Washing."

Any persons not connected with a laundry or with a company manufacturing laundry machinery, equipment, or supplies is eligible to compete. Letters must carry the contestants full name on the upper left hand corner of each page and must be written on one side only. They must be mailed not later than midnight of December 1 to the \$50,000 Competition Judges, Century Building, Indianapolis, Indiana.

Ten national prizes, ranging from \$10,000 for first place and \$5,000 for second, down to \$100 for tenth, will be awarded in cash. Ten state prizes also in cash and ranging from \$225 for first place to \$5 for tenth, will also be given. Twelve thousand honorable mention awards have also been provided. In case of a tie, tying contestants will each receive the full amount.

## Geo. Hampton's Challenge

The following letter from George Hampton, of Arago, was received and set prior to the calling off of the Corn Show. We publish it, however, as an example of the spirit Mr. Hampton has consistently shown toward the Corn Show and it will apply next year as much as it would have this.

It seems to me that the business men of Coquille have issued a challenge to the farmers of the Coquille valley by raising more money for the Corn Show this year than they have ever raised before. Will the farmers answer this challenge by bringing in more exhibits than they have ever brought before?

The business men have gone down in the pockets for over \$1200 in cold cash. Are the farmers willing to take a little time to do their part in making this show a bigger success than it has been in the past?

If every one of us farmers would spend just forty minutes in getting an exhibit ready, we could make a real show out of this. Everyone one of us could at least show a peck of potatoes, 12 carrots, 20 apples and 12 ears of corn, even if we all haven't enough corn to show 100 ears.

The parade handled by the B. & P. W. is sure to be splendid, the sports new and snappy, the play better if possible than usual in fact everything that can be done has been done to insure a wonderful time to all who attend.

The Coquille people have gone as far as they can, the rest is up to the farmers. Let's show the judges who are coming from the O. A. C. that more than five people grow corn here and let's have more than five exhibits of carrots and four of beets this year. Let's bring so much stuff that they'll have to build more tables to hold it. Let every real farmer appoint himself a committee of one to see that 12 ears of corn, 1 peck of potatoes, 12 carrots, 5 beets and 4 plates of apples get there. Come on let's go.

## What the Grand Jury Found

In view of the newspaper reports on the Bay that there were two sides to the Sam Wing trouble at the county farm, the following report made by the grand jury throws a very clear light on who made the trouble out there. It was not given until after thorough investigation:

We the undersigned, Grand Jury for said County and State in session pursuant to the order of the Circuit Court for Coos county hereby report the result of our investigation of the County Farm and County Jail of Coos County, Oregon, as follows: The Grand Jury visited the County Farm on October 18th, 1927, and inspected the buildings, equipment, live stock, crops and observed the inmates and manner of operation of said County Farm and found the same to be in excellent condition and to be under very economical and competent management. We found the buildings in good state of repair and the inmates well cared for. We commend Mr. and Mrs. Fred McNeilly most highly for the interest they take in the management of the farm and the care of the inmates.

With reference to the charge against one of the inmates, namely: Sam Wing, we find that he had been kept and well cared for at the County Farm in the same manner as the other inmates are and have been kept and that there is no proper equipment for caring for him at the County Farm on account of his being quarrelsome, vindictive, and not amenable to rules of discipline which must be enforced at the farm. We find that he has been troublesome and has made serious threats against the lives of the nurse and others at the farm but that on account of his age he should be discharged from the farm and permitted to go to his friends and if necessary the County pay a small sum each month to help maintain him.

Upon our inspection of the County Jail we find the same to be in fine condition through out.

## Broadcasting For Oregon

University of Oregon, Eugene—A debate team from the University of Oregon will have the distinction of being the first university team from the United States to tour the world, when Benoit McCroskey, Avery Thompson and Jack Hempstead leave San Francisco October 11 to debate against universities all over the world. Their first debate is scheduled at Honolulu where they will meet the University of Hawaii October 21, upholding the negative of the question: "Resolved, That foreign powers immediately relinquish extra-territorial privileges in China." This same question will be debated at the University of Hong Kong, China on November 31.

Other debates already scheduled take place at the University of Agpur, India, December 24, Oregon upholding the negative of the question: "Resolved, That democracy is a failure." They debate at the University of Edinburgh, Scotland, February 7; University of St. Jean, February 8; University of Aberdeen, February 9; University of Glasgow, February 10, the Americans taking the negative of the question: "Resolved, That Prohibition of intoxicating liquors is impractical"; and at Queen's University, Belfast, Ireland, February 11. "Resolved, That democracy is a failure." Oregon taking the affirmative.

All three of the debaters have had a great deal of experience in speaking. McCroskey and Hempstead have been members of the debate team of Oregon for three years and Thompson for two. They have all represented Oregon in Oratorical contests and have various

other qualifications which fit them for this world debate tour. Aside from their regular debates, addresses will be made in Japan, China, India and England by individual members of the team on "Political America," "The International Mind," and "Shadows of Truth."

The Oregon system of debate will be used unless requested by the contesting teams to follow another style. In the Oregon system the first affirmative speaker presents the entire affirmative case in a 15 minute speech. The first negative speaker has the same length of time to present his case. The first affirmative speaker then returns to the platform and is questioned by the second negative speaker. This is a 10 minute period. The first negative speaker then goes to the platform and is questioned by the second affirmative speaker. The second negative speaker is then given ten minutes for a consummation speech to refute and summarize as is also the second affirmative speaker.

**Rotary Club Entertains Team**  
The debate team and J. K. Hoerner, debate coach, were guests of the Rotary Club Tuesday and each gave a talk on some phase of the trip. The Rotary Club of Eugene is sending a letter of introduction by the team to the Rotary Clubs in Rome, Paris and London where arrangements will probably be made for the trip to present programs.

The team is scheduled to arrive in New York February 26, there to begin their transcontinental American tour. Definite contracts have been made with 15 United States Universities and about a dozen more are probable opponents.
