The Parchment Is Filed

From last Sunday's Oregonian it is learned that the parchment, containing the signatures of President Coolidge and all the governors of the 48 states has been filed with seals of all the states. The parchment is mounted with a myrtlewood frame, made by Oerding Industries of this city, and on its travels it has been a constant advertisement of this most beautiful of woods, which grows only in this section. The following is from the Sunday Oregonian:

After several delays, due to diverse causes, the unusual parchment which started out from Portland more than a year ago to visit every state capital and Washington, D. C., has completed its long journey. Now upon its face the parchment bears the seals of all the states and the great seal of the United States, with the signatures of all governors, secretaries of states, the president of the United States and the secretary of state.

Miss Marion Mack, screen actress, started the parchment on its way when she was in Oregon playing opposite Buster Keaton in "The General." It was assisted along its journey by newspapers in almost

every state capital. It made some 50 jumps on a carefully planned itinerary, traveling by express and well insured against loss.

The idea behind the parchment as unusual. It is designed so that, when completed, it would be of value to collectors of unique documents. It possibly is the only thing of its kind, bearing all state seals and signatures of all 48 governors and the president. The parchment, it was decided, would be auctioned off when complete for the benefit of unfortunate members of the motion picture industry.

The parchment is linked up in an interesting way with Oregon. Its frame is made of Oregon myrtlewood and since this wood grows only in this state and because that fact is cited on the face of the parchment, it has served to advertise Oregon very widely.
