Since that catastrophe the city council at North Bend has ordered a heavy rail placed along the waterfront and dock to prevent a recurrence of such a calamity.

Says They Are Not "Good" Newspaper Men

Editor Sentinel: I respectfully request space and the privilege of answering the article appearing on the front page of your worthy paper of the issue of the 6th inst., entitled, "Coos Bay Times Is Sold."

That the Maloney's "are very able newspaper men," I believe is generally conceded, but that "they are good newspaper men," I believe is generally denied in the vicinity where they are known.

Can men who have caused as much turmoil, dissension, and ill-feeling among their fellow men, who by their tactics have materially retarded the development and growth of the community in which they have operated, one of whom is defendant in an action for libel, men whose reputation for blackmail is flagrant, who have been publicly accused of being grafters of public funds, which they have not denied, who by their methods of journalism have tended to corrupt public officials, be termed "Good Newspaper Men," if so, what term fits Bad Newspaper Men?

In the body of your article you state that "they are very able newspaper men," therefore, the adjective "good" herein referred to used in the last line of your article must mean something other than "able" and its analogous terms.

Does any other definition of good fit these birds? I say, it does not. Why then term them "Good Newspaper Men?"

The Eulogy for Mike and Dan in the announcement of the new editor of the Coos Bay Times sounds as if made by themselves or by one not conversant with their "Sewer System of Journalism," practiced by them in Coos county for the past ten years or more.

Very little comment on Judge Watson's letter is necessary. From a reading of it we cannot see that Mr. Watson's opinion differs from ours as to the Maloney's. He says they are able newspaper men. And when the Sentinel said last week that they were "good newspaper men," we meant exactly the same thing. That they were good newspaper publishers for Marshfield or Coos county was not, nor has it ever been the opinion of this writer. When they attended strictly to the business of printing the news they were very capable; they got their matter up in an efficient manner; but when they allowed their personal dislikes to influence their judgment, and vented their spleen on public officials who would not dance to their piping, they created an opposition which has resulted finally in their retirement from the field.

They have finished on the Bay and can no longer be regarded as in a semi-public position.
