

SOCIAL NOTES

The year 1928 promises to be of unusual interest to the women of the Methodist Church South as it marks the fiftieth anniversary of the Woman's Missionary Society, which was organized in Atlanta, Georgia, May, 1878. It will be known as Jubilee Year and many jubilee programs will be celebrated during the year. The principles of the Jubilee are to be constructive, church-wide, inter-racial, and international.

The goals of the Jubilee are as follows:

1. A higher spiritual standard, through efforts to establish more firmly the principles of Christian living in our contacts with our fellow men.
2. An appreciation of our inheritance, which provides facilities for expressing our joy because of the wonderful inheritance that has come to the womanhood of the Church.
3. The extension of the organization, until every unenlisted woman shall become enlisted, enlightened, and interested in the evangelization of the world.
4. The re-evaluation of our task, in order to find through the leadership of God's spirit His plan for us in the future.
5. A thank offering, by which means the women of the church will be given opportunity to express their love and gratitude for the achievements of the pioneers and for the spiritual values they have received through study of their deed. This offering is to be used in developing the work now faced.

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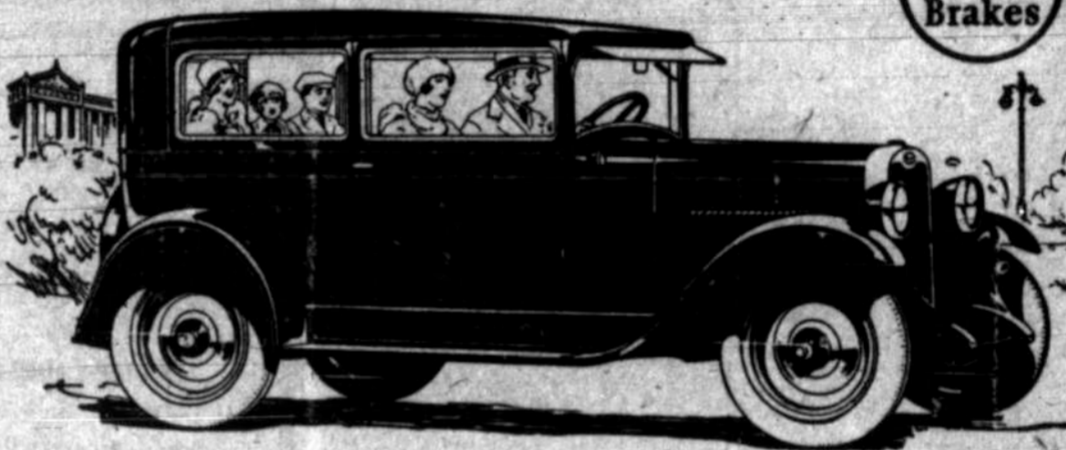
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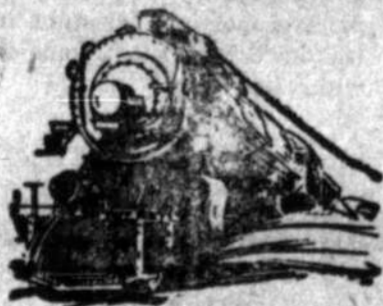
