Through the combined efforts of the American Red Cross, Salvation Army, U. S. veterans bureau, Oregon state bonus commission and the state chamber of commerce, a mass meeting of all ex-service men and women of the world war will be held at L. O. O. F. hall, North Bend, next Monday night, January 23.

This meeting has been endorsed by Governor I. L. Patterson, the state director of the American Red Cross, the state commander of the Salvation Army and other state and national organizations.

Representatives of the veterans bureau, state bonus commission and other state and national organizations will be present and will explain fully the workings of their departments and give those interested such information as will fully enable all ex-service men and women of this district to take advantage of the beneficial acts passed by the national and state governments for their relief.

Solicitor Was a Crook

About the fifteenth of November a man by the name of Wilson and a woman by the name of Apple, representing H. L. Collins Co., a reliable printing company, came to a number of ministers of Coos county with recommendations from a minister of Forest Grove and other ministers of the valley. The Mr. Wilson proposed to put out an attractive church calendar with a picture of the church and announcements, without any cost to the church, provided the church would distribute them. He said that he would get advertisements from the local merchants to pay for the calendar. He said he wanted the name of the minister, not to use it in selling advertisements, but only to let the business men know that he had the minister's consent. He was to sell adds purely from a business standpoint.

When the calendars did not arrive at the appointed time and when we heard that some of the merchants had paid for their advertisement before seeing the calendar we began to be suspicious and wrote to the company he represented. They informed us that Mr. Wilson worked for them in North and South Dakota last October, a year ago but not since.

There is no doubt but what he is a crook. He has misused the names of ministers and churches, deceived the people, and collected money under false pretense. We are trying to get a warrant of arrest for him and are doing all in our power to bring him to justice. He has worked the towns of Myrtle Point, Bandon, Coquille and, perhaps, other towns in the county besides those in the valley.

We had no idea that he would try to collect in advance or that the merchants would pay before seeing the calendar, but if any merchant paid him because of our names we will be glad to pay that merchant the price he paid if he will present to us his receipt. We feel that "a good name is rather to be chosen than great riches."
