Rev. A. W. Stuernagle

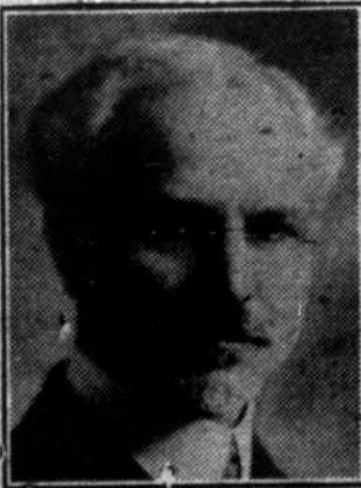
Noted Evangelist,
