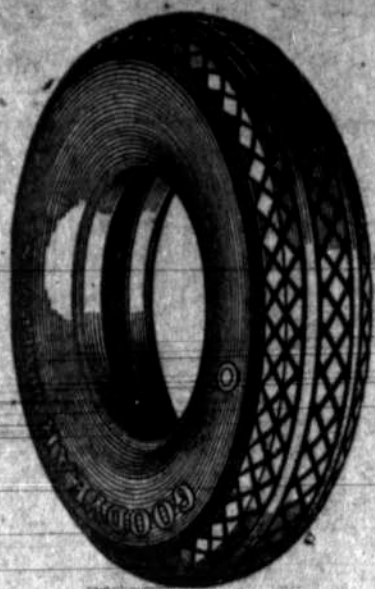

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Syrian Wedding Custom

An ancient Syrian custom which is sometimes observed even at the present time is the assumption by a newly married couple of a royal status. Drainage Conference at O. A. C.

H. E. Hess, of the Fat Elk Drainage District directorate, is in receipt of an announcement from W. L. Powers, drainage expert at O. A. C., of the meeting of the State Drainage Association at Corvallis on Tuesday, Feb. 7.

"Every Drainage District and all organizations interested should be represented at the coming session. You are requested to encourage attendance, name delegates and advise the Secretary as to the names of those who will represent your District or section at the conference," writes Mr. Powers.

"The tentative program includes addresses by the Associate Chief in Drainage Investigations of the U. S. Department of Agriculture; and the Drainage Specialists from the University of Arizona and from Washington State as well as leaders in drainage reclamation workers in Oregon. The program is being arranged to give special attention to drainage and improvement of wet soils in the Willamette Valley and on the Coast."

Miss Ina Christensen, teacher, will have regular work with the pupils until noon, the visiting teachers being observers. RADIO

Eye-Tuned Set to Control Speaker

Expert Describes Radio Development Rectifying Fading Effects.

A method whereby tuning of the radio is done visually rather than by ear, as at present, and which automatically controls the volume of the loud speaker, so that the maximum volume level can never exceed a certain definite value, was described by Harold A. Wheeler of Johns Hopkins University before the Institute of Radio Engineers at New York.

Not only is distortion eliminated, according to the inventor, but also—and, what is very important—distant signals, which fade rather badly, are controlled automatically, so that the maximum volume level can never exceed a definite value.

Fading signals have heretofore been a drawback to the use of sensitive multistage radio-frequency receivers because of the constantly changing levels of loud-speaker volume. The device described before the Institute of Radio Engineers entirely corrects these difficulties.

The name "audiostat" has been selected for this device by reason of its tendency to maintain the audible intensity at a constant value. However, actual control of intensity level is not accomplished within the audio amplifier system, but rather in one or more of the radio-frequency stages.

These results are obtained through the action of the receiver detector or rectifier, which in turn applies a negative biasing voltage in proportion to the strength of the received signals to one or more of the tubes within the radio-frequency stages.

In this way output volume is maintained at a definite standard. Of course, for the case of fading signals, such a device can only control that signal element which is above the required volume level. Where signals fade to a low value or entirely disappear it is apparent that neither the audiostat nor any other available device can correct the deficiency.

In consequence of the automatic control action it becomes difficult to accurately tune by ear a receiving set equipped with the new improvement. The amplification is decreased as the response to the signal is increased by

tuning, and vice versa, so that the point of resonance is indicated by minimum plate currents in the neutralized stages of the radio-frequency amplifier. In other words, tuning is simply accomplished by eye instead of ear through a visual indication of a millimeter connected in the plate circuit of the first tube. This arrangement is employed as a resonance indicator and also to give an indication of relative signal intensities.

More Than One Set on Antenna Not So Good

Hooking up more than one set to the same antenna seriously affects reception. This is a fact apparently not generally known, points out a manufacturer's home organ.

"One at a time is the safe rule," warns the bulletin in this matter, relating the incident of a dealer who called up a distributor complaining of the operation of a receiver. Investigation by a service man resulted in finding out that the dealer had some six or eight sets working on the same antenna.

"While only one set was turned on the others were hooked up on the same antenna," continued the bulletin, "which seriously affected reception. This may be a fact not generally known, but more than one set should not be hooked up to the same antenna at the same time. Such a condition may seriously impair the results of a demonstration."

It would be well for fans to keep this information in mind, also, and the bulletin points out that "a series of switches will permit the demonstration of a number of sets on the part of the dealer using the same antenna, but all the sets except the one on demonstration should be disconnected always from the antenna even though they are not turned on."

RADIO TIPS

When troubled with static noises try an indoor antenna. Use a short piece of wire, running it around the room under the rug or carpet or up around the picture molding.

Carbon resistors are most frequently to blame when a hissing noise comes from the loud speaker. The trouble may be traced to a grid leak or to a plate coupling resistor. Sometimes the cause is a corroded contact and most frequently occurs at the positive terminal of the storage battery.

It is necessary to have good tubes to obtain good tone quality in a set. The proper tubes must be employed for the radio frequency, detector and audio functions. Most important of all, a power tube must be employed in the last stage

so as to handle the full volume without apparent forcing. The proper plate voltages and the grid biases, where needed, must be applied on the tubes.

Power of Love

Once when John Ruskin and Thomas Carlyle were discussing the literature of their day, the latter said to his companion: "Can you tell me why it is that works on subjects of vital interest to the race, splendidly written by men of profound scholarship, command scarcely sufficient sale to pay the cost of publishing; while trashy novels, false to history, false to philosophy and false to the facts of human experience, and altogether lacking in literary merit, will sell by scores of thousands?"

After a short pause, Ruskin replied: "There is but one explanation of that fact, but the explanation is all-sufficient; the novel has love in it and the other has not."—Scribner's Magazine.

Fragments of Bo'tle

Good Legal Evidence

Fragments of a broken bottle once settled a legal dispute as to the location of the original corner post of a surveyed tract. It was customary in the old surveys to place broken bottles, crockery or other articles that would resist decay in the holes where the corner posts were to be set, and notes of such deposits were recorded by the surveyor in his book.

On this particular occasion, when an effort was being made to establish the location of a post in Canada which had been set sixty years previously, the surveyor's gang dug for two days over an area covering more than fifty square feet. Finally the diggers unearthed broken glass with embossings that corresponded to the notes in the original surveyor's book. With this point established, more than thirty posts in the vicinity were restored and the dispute over the boundary lines was settled.—Kansas City Star.
