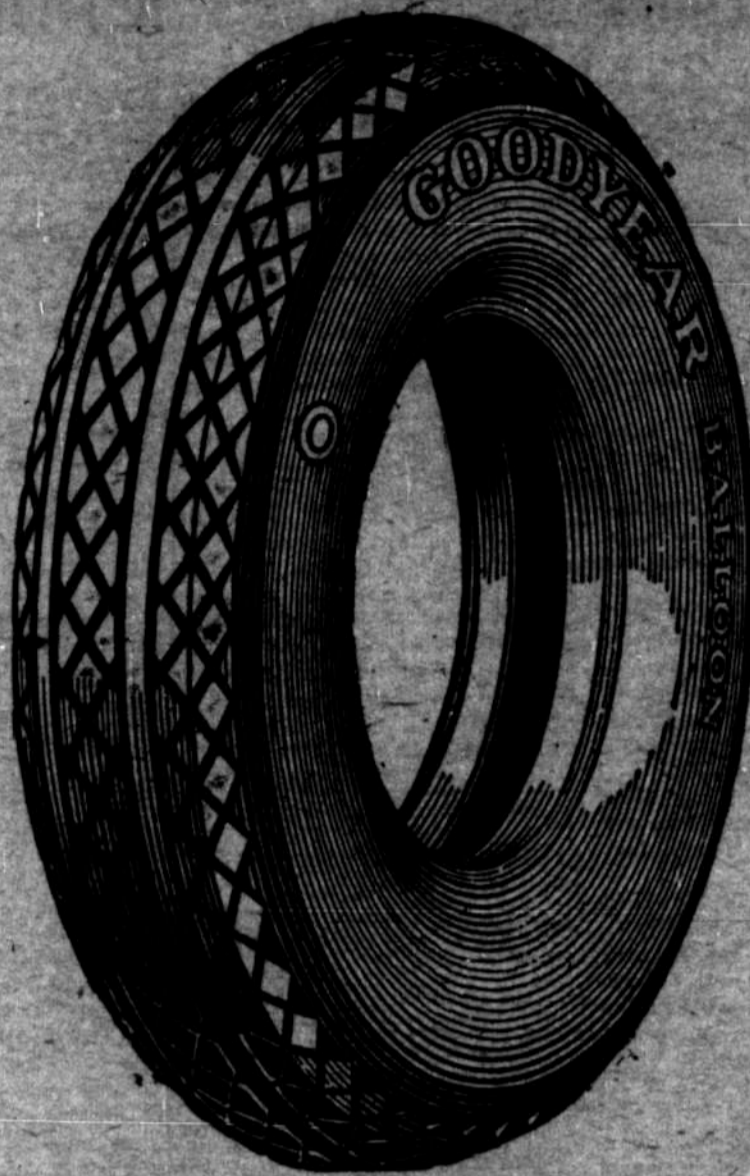

### Courses Do Not Help Candidates

The United States Civil Service Commission has sent a circular letter to advertising managers of newspapers and periodicals throughout the country citing figures which indicate the practical worthlessness of widely advertised correspondence courses in preparation for forest ranger examinations.

The Commission says in the letter

that it has made a survey of the examination papers of 1081 competitors in the forest ranger examination held last October and that of the 675 competitors who had no correspondence training, 189 passed the examination, while 337 competitors who had taken a correspondence course in preparation for the examination, exactly 18 passed. Sixty-nine were noncommittal as to training in advance. All of these failed.
