Men Speak at Woman's Club

Four more men attended the annual meeting of the Coquille Woman's Club Tuesday afternoon, at the J. A. Lamb residence, were cordially welcomed, allowed to say their pieces, fed with sandwiches, cookies and coffee, and on their departure thanked for their presence.

Following a custom inaugurated by Mrs. T. B. Currie last year, Mrs. C. V. Smith, the club president, asked Mayor Skeels, J. L. Smith, president of the Chamber of Commerce; J. L. Stevens, Lions Club president; and the editor of the Sentinel to be present.

What the men said was not of so much importance as were some of the things we heard there. For instance, that the Woman's Club had given to the Public Library last year, \$600, and a letter from the state librarian asked how they had done it. We all wondered. This year their contribution to the library will be but \$20 a month, but they have numerous other projects in mind that will call for funds. One is their plan to have constructed gateway pillars at the three entrances to Coquille.

With a membership of about forty, the ladies are accomplishing great things.

Mrs. Emily Smith Died Saturday

Mrs. Emily Maria Smith passed away at her home on the highway, west of the Masonic cemetery last Saturday, at the age of 82 years, 9 months and 18 days. Funeral services were conducted at the Schroeder-Gano Chapel Tuesday afternoon at two o'clock.

Born Emily Maria Young, in Windham county, Connecticut, June 19, 1845, the deceased went with her parents to Clinton county, Iowa, at the age of nine.

She was married to Charles Smith, an honorably discharged soldier of the Civil War, who passed away here Feb. 21, 1927, on Nov. 29, 1866. Seven children were born to them. One son, Howard, died in infancy. Those surviving are Misses Emily Smith and Grace Smith, of Coquille; Mrs. Anna M. Johnson, of Coquille; Mrs. Emily Squire, of Milwaukie, Oregon; Mrs. Lucretia Stille, of Salina, Kans.; and E. B. Smith, of Carterville, Mo.

She leaves also a sister, Mrs. M. J. Leonard, of Holstein, Iowa; and two brothers, W. H. Young, of Prescott, Iowa; and Josiah Young, of Beatrice, Nebraska; besides 17 grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

Prowler Arrested and Released

Marshal Hickam arrested a stranger in front of Roy Abbott's home on Heath street, about 12:30 last Saturday night, who had been acting in a manner to arouse suspicion.

The fellow, who gave no name, had been observed to go to the rear of Fred Hudson's place five different times, and he had also been fooling around the Al Garten and Wigant homes across the street from Hudson's. Former Coquille Man a Suicide

The following press dispatch Tuesday tells of the suicide of a young man who has made Coquille his home, off and on, for the past ten years or more. He was a brother of Mrs. E. H. Harnden and made his home on their Fat Elk ranch for a time. No reason for his act has been learned:

"The body of M. R. Boyd, Coquille, who committed suicide by drowning in the Santiam river at Jefferson Saturday afternoon was shipped Monday by Coroner E. C. Fisher to Story City, Iowa, in charge of Mrs. E. H. Harnden, a sister.

"Boyd was riding on an Oregon stage bus when he suddenly jumped onto the floor of the bridge, to the top of the bridge rail and leaped into the water."

A petition was filed by A. J. Sherwood in probate court yesterday asking that I. R. Cribbins be named as guardian of his daughter, Frances Ann Cribbins. Her mother, Mrs. Jas. R. Walter Newbury, of Coquille, on Monday filed his petition as candidate for the democratic nomination for county clerk.

Mr. Newbury is bookkeeper in the tax department of the sheriff's office, having spent about six years in the office, under two separate appointments. He has also been in the employ of the Bank of Powers and of the Coos Bay Logging Co. at Powers, so is quite familiar with all kinds of office work.

He was a graduate of the University of Valparaiso in Indiana, in 1909, and has spent 16 years since that time doing clerical work.

Deputy Game Warden Moved

The last arrest made by Deputy C. A. Hearing in southwestern Oregon for game law violations was last week when he picked up C. L. McCready on the headwaters of Sixes river for fishing without a license. He paid a \$25 and costs at Gold Beach before the J. P.

Mr. and Mrs. Hearing left Tuesday morning for Portland and expected to be located by the commission at Oregon City for the present. Mr. Hearing is an efficient officer who is sent anywhere in the state that assistance is needed in enforcing the game laws.

Dal King Out for Dist. Atty.

After serving Coos county for two sessions in the state legislature, Dal M. King, of Myrtle Point, has forsaken the law-making branch of state government and this week filed as a candidate for the republican nomination for district attorney. Dal is a graduate of the state university law school, is a member of the Coos county bar, and made a good record as representative in the legislature. He will make an active campaign for the nomination.

Editor Sentinel: I would like a little space in your paper to correct a slight mistake as reported in connection with the proceedings of the city council: in which I am ascribed with a statement, "that carpenters and brickmasons were doing the plumbing," which statement was not made by me; as I have no personal knowledge of seeing any such work installed excepting by men having the required credentials.

My remarks on the council floor were directed to emphasize the necessity of having a qualified inspector for such work for which the city should receive a very nominal fee, and in return the inspector should be capable of giving intelligent advice where needed.

This matter was first brought to the attention of the council members by the health department and I was asked by Dr. Drake to see that it was acted upon at regular meeting. Yours very truly, E. G. Opperman.

Court Awards Two Contracts

The Myrtle Point Herald was last Tuesday awarded the contract for printing the 1928 delinquent tax summons at its lump sum bid of \$220. The Sentinel's bid was 3 cents a line for 20-em lines (four columns to the page) and the Daily News offered to do it at the legal rate of 5 cents a line. It will make about five pages the size of the Sentinel.

The Astoria-North Beach Ferry Co. was awarded the contract Tuesday for three years, for the operation of a ferry between Marshfield and Eastside, at their bid of \$53,800 for the

period. The company agreed to furnish a ferry capable of carrying 16 automobiles and 150 passengers, and to operate on the advertised 20-minute schedule. There were four bidders.
