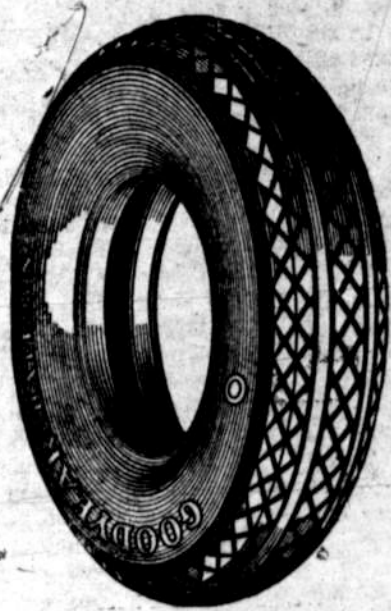


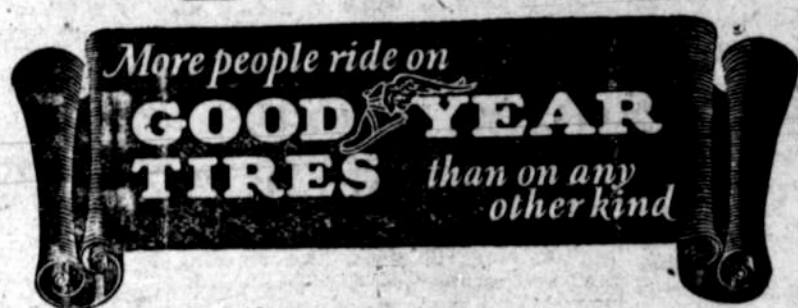

Power Company Enjoys Prosperous Year in 1927

That 1927 was a period of prosperity throughout the territory served by Mountain States Power Company, is evident from its annual report, copies of which have just been received by C. C. Archibald, manager of the local office.

Gross earnings for the past year indicated in the annual report, amounted to \$3,391,690.00, which is an increase of 8.11 per cent over the previous year.

Summarizing the major activities of the company during the past year, the report reads as follows:

"By the completion of an 85-mile high tension transmission line, connecting the properties of the Casper division with the Government hydro-electric project at Guernsey, the company gave to Wyoming its first interconnected power system. It is expected that this line, making possible the irrigation of thousands of acres of land, will prove a major factor in the development of this territory.

"Effective December 31, 1927, the Company's gas properties at Tacoma, Olympia and Everett, Washington, were sold to the Washington Gas and Electric Company. These gas properties are distant from the principal territories served by Mountain States Power Company, the business of which is chiefly electric power and light service. Earlier in the year the Company's electric and gas distribution systems at Snohomish and Monroe, Washington, were sold. Following the sale of the gas properties, headquarters of the Company were moved to Albany, Oregon.

"Excluding the gas properties sold, the Company served, as of December 31, an estimated population of 168,000 in 88 cities and towns. Customers of all classes number 50,736. During the year more than 500 customers were added to electric lines in rural districts, raising the total number of customers of this type to more than 2,500.

"Net construction expenditures amounted to \$892,213.00 in 1927; for 1928 the construction budget is \$82,000.00.

"During the year the Company redeemed and retired \$496,400.00 face value Series 'A' 7 per cent gold notes. The amount of 7 per cent preferred stock outstanding increased \$1,032,900.00 par value through the sale of shares under the customer ownership plan, and by conversion of notes. The Company now has approximately 3,000 customer shareholders.

"Discussing conditions during 1927 the prospects for 1928, Mr. C. M. Brewer, vice-president and general manager of our company, says:

"If the purchasing power of the individual may be considered an authentic index to the commercial and industrial situation, 1927 was synonymous with prosperity in the six northwestern states in which Mountain States Power Company operates. That this period of affluence will continue at a moderate rate of increase during the coming year is the opinion of conservative economists.

"While each successive year sees a marked increase in the sale and use of improved electric and gas-fired appliances in the home, the saturation point has not been approached. Considering the satisfactory volume of business in all lines in 1927, as reflected by the sales of domestic appliances and other barometers of business, even the most conservative is impelled to be enthusiastic about commercial and industrial prospects for 1928 in the great, growing Pacific Northwest."

M. H. Hansen, of Langlois, was last Monday appointed administrator of the \$6,563 estate of his brother, Schmidt Hansen, who died in France, Oct. 13, 1918. A. H. Rosa, Chris Rasmussen and G. R. McNair are the appraisers.

Claud H. Giles has been named as executor of the will of Cordelia E. Rackleff, who died at Myrtle Point, April 1.

R. C. Dement, T. D. Guerin and N. G. W. Perkins are the appraisers of the estate which is estimated to be worth \$1,000 in real property and \$20,000 in personal.

Phil J. Keizer, Jno. H. Greaves and C. E. Maybee are the appraisers of the \$650 estate of John A. Walker, who died April 8. William Lancefield, of Amity, Ore., is the administrator.

Merle Fox, of Charleston, has been appointed administratrix of the \$800 estate of Alice Stemmerman, who died Dec. 21, 1927, at Marshfield. True Saling, Harry Stull and Alfred Rodine are the appraisers.
