More About the City's Water

A great many people are getting careless and are not paying their water bill on time.

It's the same old story, "I forgot it," you don't forget to pay postage to Uncle Sam, for he don't extend credit, and the City's business should be conducted along the same lines, for water bonds are to be paid on time and the city must have the money when these bonds and interest come due.

Why not put a little slip in your bill file, drawer or wherever you put your bills to be paid—just a word or two, "Pay the Water," and let it remain there from month to month. It would always be a reminder.

There are about seven hundred (700) customers on the water books and there are about six hundred who always pay before the 20th of the month. Try to get your name in this list and let's make it unanimous.

Water Superintendent Epperson says the hours for sprinkling lawns or other irrigation is from six (6) to eight (8) o'clock in the evening and no longer. So please don't turn on the water before six and be sure you turn it off at eight o'clock.
