Coquille Won on 5-4, 14 Innings

Coquille won a 14-inning game at Myrtle Point last Sunday by a score of 5-4. "Penny" Sturdivant pitched for 13 innings and allowed but eight hits, striking out 15 men. Coquille made nine hits, two of them coming in the fourteenth inning when Carl Gilbert's three bagger followed by a single by Otto Davis, scored the winning run.

It was a very interesting game to watch and showed that Myrtle Point has strengthened to a point where it is a match for any team in the league.

The game at Bandon was won by Marshfield, 5-2. It was a tight game until the eighth inning, when Bandon's catcher, Cardinell, was guilty of an error in judgment in failing to touch a runner coming in to plate. Instead he threw to first on an attempted double play and all hands were safe, two runs scoring. A double brought in the third run of the inning.

Roselle, for Bandon, tried to start a riot by objecting to a decision Lucky Bonney made at second base, when he called Kane, Bandon second baseman out. To this scorer, it seemed that Kane was out and as Bonney was right on top of the play there is no doubt in any unprejudiced mind as to the correctness of his decision.

After the game Roselle rushed up to Bonney and tried to get him to "beat it," stating that the umpire was going to be mobbed. Bonney laughed at him.

It was a tough game to umpire, with a number of close decisions, but the Sentinel repeats its statement of last week that Bonney is a fair and impartial umpire. Postpone Booklet Till 1929

At the meeting of the Coos County Chamber of Commerce at the hotel here Monday evening, it was decided not to attempt publication of the county booklet, advertising the recreational features of Coos county, until after the first of the year. A. C. Chase, of Myrtle Point, has the material for all three booklets—the recreational, industrial, and farming—in hand, but the Chamber decided that it would be better to devote their efforts this year to financing the publications, and have them published early next year. The county has appropriated for the work already done from its 1928 budget, and additional funds will not be available before 1929.

The Chamber also decided to refer to the several chambers of commerce in the county the matter of securing more trout fry for planting in Coos county streams. With the advertising to be sent out, describing this section as the sportsman's and fisherman's paradise, it is necessary that attention be paid to keeping the streams well stocked with trout.

Favors Rural Road Improvement

Wm. Hagge, republican nominee for county commissioner, was over from Marshfield yesterday morning. Among other things which he mentioned, needed for the upbuilding and development of the resources of Coos county, was the matter of rural roads. He sees it as so many others do, that Coos county cannot put all its eggs in one basket and depend on the lumber industry to keep the wheels of commerce revolving. The development of the dairy and farming business is vital to this section of Oregon, and he sees in the Coos County Good Roads Association program for a bond issue, the logical action for a comprehensive system of rural roads which will aid in doubling the dairy herds of Coos county and bringing its fertile valleys to the highest point of cultivation.

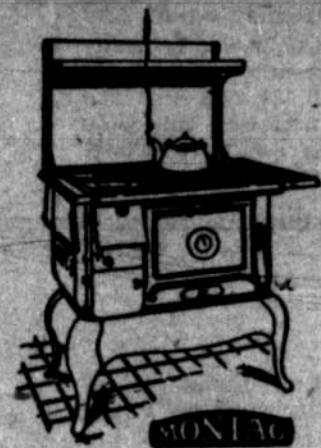
