City Council Business

At the regular meeting of the city council Monday evening, E. G. Opperman reported on the amicable settlement agreed upon by the city officials and the residents of the north end of the city.

Petitions have been prepared, and are in circulation, which request that the signers' names be removed from the petition, previously presented, which would have compelled a vote on the initiated charter amendments and eventually have prevented street improvements.

A petition which the council was reluctantly compelled to deny was that of Sanford Heights residents who asked for city water. The people out there wanted to lay the mains from the city limits without expense to the city, but the councilmen did not feel justified in permitting the use of water outside the city until a larger source of supply is available.

It is coming to be more evident each year that the Coquille river must be used as a source of supply. This would, of course, entail expense for pumping plant, settling basins, etc., but it is the only way in which an adequate supply can be secured.

Building permits to Marc Shelley, for his first street store building, and to E. W. Gregg for his new house near his own home, were issued.

Harding & Jenkins were paid \$538.17, about half the amount of their contract, for the improvement job they are doing on North Heath street.

The water committee reported that it would cost about \$400 to lay a two-inch water main for 1060 feet north and west from the W. W. Gage residence. This would serve people in the vicinity of the A. N. Foley and W. A. Ireland homes. No definite action was taken.

Elsewhere in this issue of the Sentinel appear fourteen notices by Marshal Hickam offering for sale lots and parcels of land on which the property owners have not bonded nor paid improvement taxes assessed by the city. In all instances the owners have declared they would not pay the assessments or have ignored the de-recorder's notices that payment is due.

After some talk of blocking the First street bridge, the council decided to leave the matter to the street committee. It has been reported as unsafe. No funds are available for its reconstruction and it may be that new decking is all that will be required for a few years yet.

O. A. C. Graduates 521

To see a class of 521 students graduated from O. A. C. last Monday morning was an inspiring sight. This impression was general for the enthusiasm which brought from three to four thousand people into the men's gymnasium for the commencement exercises was contagious, and the applause of the audience, as the graduates received the coveted sheepskin, was continuous.

No less inspiring was the address by Dr. Stephen B. L. Penrose, president of Whitman College, whose subject was, "The New Social Consciousness."

Higher education was formerly regarded as an indication of social supremacy, than as a means of securing a higher standard of living, but the idea of service to country and mankind is the new order of thinking, according to Dr. Penrose, and "service" was the real subject of his discourse.

W. J. Kerr, president of O. A. C., pointed out to the visitors, the new buildings going up on the campus without expense to the taxpayers.

The new Memorial Union, the men's dormitory now started and another building will cost over one million dollars, but not a cent of construction costs comes from taxes. Contributions from students, alumni and other generous citizens have made these additions to the college plant possible. Oregon has a wonderful school, which is still growing, in its State Agricultural College.

Besides those from Coquille, elsewhere noted, the editor greeted Mrs. E. C. Leach, formerly Miss Theresa Clinton of this city, whose home is now at Alpine, in Benton county, at the commencement exercises.
