It was a game full of action at Athletic Park here last Sunday, but there were no balls knocked over the fence. A near fight added to the excitement, but it was stopped before any damage was done. The row occurred in the fourth inning when Feightinger let one get past him. The ball hit Richardson's breast protector and the umpire waved Perry Roper in from third. As he approached the plate Feightinger jabbed the ball onto him, yelling, "You're out!" Roper brushed him hand away and the catcher swung on Roper's check. The latter had landed just one blow in return when both players were stopped from further hostilities.

The Marshfield club hated like the mischief to lose that game; they craved at all close decisions and when the disastrous sixth saw their hopes of a clean record of wins vanish they went to pieces. Bases on balls, passed balls, errors and two hits resulted in six runs for Coquille and clinched the game.

Marshfield was hitting the ball all right, they got ten safe blows, but notwithstanding the seven errors chalked up against Coquille, the locals were on their toes and cut off many a runner later who had reached first safely.

Mosier, who relieved Sweigel in the sixth inning, pitched one ball to Davis, walking him and forcing in a run, but he was unhittable after that.

Only one game behind the league-leading Bay team, Coquille has a chance to tie that club and possibly win out. But without a substitute on the bench, an injury to any of the nine players would prove disastrous.

Bandon won from Myrtle Point Sunday, by a 6-4 score.

BOYS CARRY ON WITH SMITH-HUGHES WORK

School has been "out" for over a month now but the boys carrying home projects in Smith-Hughes agriculture are still being supervised in their work. This keeps them "on their toes," and the tendency to relax during the summer is largely overcome. Initiative developed in the project work gives the phrase "we learn by doing" a vital and fuller meaning.

Neil B. McGilvery last year was a freshman in Coquille high school. He enrolled in the Smith-Hughes course, selecting a poultry project for his home work. That he laid his plans well and performed the duties regularly is evidenced by his own project report, which follows:

"On March 17th I bought 132 Barred Rock chicks from the Smith Sisters of Coquille. Their stock came from the O. A. C. experiment station at Corvallis. Their flock averaged 240 eggs per bird per year. My chicks were allowed range during the day and kept in boxes during the night for two weeks. Then I made a pen near the chicken house to which I transferred them. I lost only three chicks the first six weeks, which when compared with the losses suffered by experienced poultrymen, is very small. I still have 120 healthy chicks. I now have 12 capons and 25 more to caponize soon. I expect to get more per pound for them as they are considered more palatable than ordinary fowl. They will be marketed locally about Christmas time. The expenses for the three months have been as follows: 132 baby chicks, \$19.80; Albers pullet mash and scratch, \$23.90; total, \$43.70. This shows a cost of 35 cents per bird and the flock is now well worth \$100, which makes a profit of 48 cents per bird for my labor. I put in about 75 hours, which gives me approximately 75 cents per hour. By the first of October I intend to have 60 pullets laying. I also hope to have about 12 cockerels to sell or trade for unrelated birds."

The Fourth at Crescent City

Mr. and Mrs. M. M. McVay, L. F. Byrne and Bert Yuill, of Crescent City, were in Coquille last Saturday, spreading publicity for the Fourth of July celebration to be held there next Wednesday. The people of Crescent City have made elaborate plans for the celebration and they are expecting that many Coos county people will avail themselves of this chance to enjoy the beauties of the Roosevelt Highway and celebrate the nation's birthday at the same time.

Dixie Service Station Opens

The new name will be "Dixie Service Station." New signs have been made and the station will soon be painted in bright colors.
