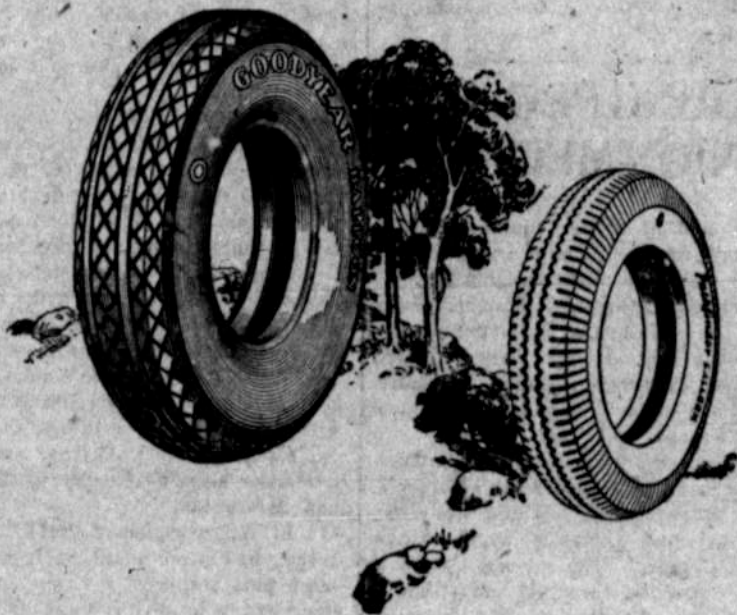

Albert Irvine Rogers

Funeral services were conducted at the Schroeder & Gano Chapel here Monday afternoon for Albert Irvine Rogers, who died about midnight last Friday night at his home just east of Spurgeon Hill. The services were conducted by Rev. N. E. Jennings, and interment was in the Masonic cemetery.

Although not in the best of health, Mr. Rogers had been around as usual the day before.

He was born in Maine, Aug. 13, 1863, being 63 years, 10 months and 16 days of age. A daughter, living in Maine, survives him, as does his widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Sell Rogers, to whom he was married April 14 this year.

He came to Coos county something over a year ago, and very little is known of his earlier life in the east.

Miller, 27 years of age and unmarried, was drowned in the Umpqua river after midnight Saturday when his new Chevrolet sedan hit the railing of the bridge near Gardiner, plunged through it and into the swollen stream. He had been to a dance, had taken his companion home and had started for his own home when the accident happened. Whether he went to sleep, or just what caused the fatality is not known.

COQUILLE WINS TWO-- GOES INTO FIRST PLACE

Before a crowd of 1,000 people Coquille moved into first place in the Coos County League Wednesday by defeating the Bandon club, down there, 8-5. Carl Gilbert deserves a lot of credit for winning the game, but he was backed up by sparkling fielding that saved the game several times.

Perry Roper made a star play in the last inning when he grabbed one in his gloved hand right close to the left field fence, with his back turned to the diamond. Art Pulford lost credit for one of the prettiest plays of the game when he grabbed a slow bouncing ball with an instantaneous toss to first. The play was so close that Umpire Oerding called the runner safe, but it looked like an out from the players' bench. Harry missed another in the seventh when he called Winters safe on a ball hit to Pulford. The ball beat Winters to the bag by a step but Harry saw it otherwise.

Gilbert did not issue a pass during the afternoon, and only struck out two. Bandon hit safely in every inning but the eighth and ninth, but so well were the hits scattered that five runs were all they garnered.

Bill Stewart played a star game at short and cut off several that looked good for hits.

Coquille got a start in the first when Harper, of Springfield, pitching for Bandon, walked Fred Lund and Pulford to start the game. Roper singled, scoring Lund, and after Fortier and Barnes had fled out, Mulligan's scorching single scored Pulford and Roper.

A hit by Stewart, another walk to Lund and a single by Pulford, scored Lund, assisted by an error by Plummer, in the second. Schmid relieved Harper at this point, but in the fifth a walk, a two-bagger by Fortier, a sacrifice and two errors scored two more.

With Gilbert going so well, that looked like enough runs to win the game, but when Bandon made one in the third, two in the fifth and one each in the sixth and seventh, things were getting too close for comfort.

In the ninth Gilbert started to cinch the game with a hot single to left. Lund singled; Fasnacht muffed up Pulford's hit to third, and with a passed ball and wild pitch interspersed, Gilbert and Lund both crossed the rubber.

The Coquille club netted a good slice of the \$395 admission money.

BEST CARD YET PRESENTED BY LEGION

One of the best cards put on in Coos county for years was that of last Saturday night in the Community Building here. There were no one-round knockouts, but there was action and speed, and the boys were quite evenly matched.

The American Legion, which sponsored the card, did not make any money out of it but they added to their reputation of giving the fans a first class performance. The gate amounted to \$375.

Frankie Burnell, of Portland, was given the knockout decision in the sixth round of his battle with Jack O'Neil, of Marshfield, although no one saw the blow immediately preceding the count. O'Neil had done a lot of wild swinging, throwing himself to the floor from the force of his blows which did not land, and Frankie had eluded him several that knocked O'Neil down, but when the latter went down for the count no one in the ringside section saw the blow.

The semi-final between Cliff Hunter, the Panama kid, of Portland, and Orlando Farmer, of Eugene, went the full six rounds with the Kid getting the decision. He was the more experienced of the two, but Farmer stood up and fought.

The six round bout between Ray Nowlin, of Gold Beach and Piper Johnson, of Coquille, was a whirlwind while it lasted. Piper carried

the fight to Nowlin in the first and the latter covering up, but he was in no condition to keep it up and Nowlin reversed it in the second, hammering Piper almost at will. He was several pounds heavier, but no one could accuse Johnson of lacking a fighting heart. He was game until his seconds threw the towel in the second round.

There was lots of booing at Referee Scott's decision awarding the verdict to Charley Wilson, of Bandon, over Ellsworth Willett, of Lee, in their 4-round mix, but fight fans who have followed the game were all agreed that Wilson had Willett bested. The boxing commissioners told Wilson to award decisions as he saw them; draws were not wanted unless the match was too nearly even to warrant picking one over the other.

In the curtain raiser Shirley Hatcher, of Coquille, was flattened for the count just before the bell sounded for the close of the tenth round, by Bliss Ward, of Bandon. Both youngsters were full of fight but Ward carried a little too much dynamite for the local boy.

With the reputation now established for presenting good cards, the American Legion will draw an ever increasing number of fans to their monthly programs in the future.
