Intersection Collision Monday

A wreck at the principal intersection in Coquille—Taylor and Second streets—about 4 p. m. Monday attracted a large crowd. No one was seriously injured, although a Studebaker touring car, driven by Mrs. Belle Doyle, of Empire, was considerably damaged.

Her car was struck by the Buick coupe driven by Miss Marjorie Ashton. The latter, accompanied by her mother, Mrs. G. W. Ashton, had practically stopped at the sign in front of Folsom's Confectionery, had been put in second gear and started up again without the driver ever seeing Mrs. Doyle's car coming down the highway from the north.

The Buick bumper caught the Studebaker rear fender and the front of the rear left wheel, whirling it around and turning it completely over so that the four wheels were in the air. It was quickly righted, Mrs. Doyle helped out and assisted into the Hub store until Miss Ashton took her home. Beyond the shock and a few bruises Mrs. Doyle was uninjured.

The Buick was practically undamaged. The Studebaker suffered a badly jammed top, smashed fenders, broken glass and other damages. Mr. Ashton's car was covered by insurance, with the personal liability clause, and there is small likelihood of any court action following.
