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R. A. Easton's Weekly Letter

We heard part of the democratic national convention by radio. Judging by part of the speech of Mrs. Ross, ex-governor of Wyoming, the burden of the lament which came out of Houston was voiced by her and echoed by others, when she recommended nominating Al Smith for the reason he could get the votes. What she and the whole democratic professed seemed to be banking on to put Al across were the votes of the galleries and the sidewalks of New York, manipulated and controlled by the Tammany tiger.

The republican convention struck me as a gathering of people who were not subject to the dictates of the bosses but were dominated by an earnest desire to nominate a man for president of the United States, who is capable and dependable and of whom the country need not be ashamed. The democratic convention struck me as made of delegates who, in a large way, were controlled by the bosses who for four years have been grooming their nominee on the ground that he is a vote-getter in New York, therefore he is our best bet to get votes outside of New York. That which puzzles me is how Gov. Al Smith and Senator Joe Robinson occupy the same bed. Can the believer in the things of righteousness and sobriety be yoked with an unbeliever? The democratic wedding which took place at Houston looks to me like a marriage of expediency.

Al Smith's record as a supporter of liquor and vice is in the Oregon Farmer of June 28, page 4, compiled in 1927 by the Anti-Saloon campaign committee of New York, going back as far as 1904. Twenty-seven times his vote has counted in favor of the saloon or the whore-house, known as assignation houses or the "Rainey Law Hotel." Twice he is unrecorded, once putting additional restrictions in the Rainey Law; once, on measure against bribery of representatives of labor organizations.

In 1913 he appointed eight Tammany men out of 13 on Assembly executive committee. Can the tiger change his stripes? In his recent record as governor of New York, when he signed the bill which opposed the constitution of the United States and the Volstead act, Al Smith used his hand to nullify the Eighteenth amendment to the constitution as far as it was in his power to do so. It was his hand which signed the bill repealing state enforcement laws in New York! Can the tiger change his stripes?

The fight is on. "The Son of God goes forth to war," counting on the valor of men and women to do their duty and "fight the good fight" for the cause of righteousness.

The question is, "How are the women going to vote in this election, for Al Smith, his booze and red lights, or 'For God and Home and Native Land'?"

No doubt in my mind but the women with the ballot in their hands will help God answer the prayers of those old W. C. T. U. crusaders of the seventies by voting for Hoover and Curtis.

Al Smith deserves credit at least for making his position clear. Should he be elected president (which the saints forbid), he says he will enforce the prohibition laws, along with all other laws, but that he will recommend to congress and urge state control of the liquor business. A declared wet on a dry platform is an anomalous condition, but the dry southern democrats would not have stood for less than a dry declaration.

The Cottage Grove Sentinel says that "With a wet president and with wet governors we can easily believe that prohibition enforcement would be lax. The record already is that such enforcement is lax in states having wet executives. Those who have visited New York and Illinois, for example, report that liquor consumption in those states is almost as open as it was in the days before the eighteenth amendment was adopted. Coming closer to home, we are reliably in-

formed that in California and Nevada liquor dispensaries run almost without let or hindrance. Flagrant violations of the prohibition amendment seem to have increased rapidly as it has become apparent that enforcement is difficult or not desired."

Nor is it necessary to go outside the state of Oregon to find flagrant violations. A prominent citizen of Coos Bay remarked to us last week that he could buy it over the bar, if he so desired, in several towns in Coos county.

Larger Horse Show This Fall

With very largely increased stakes this year, made possible through the generous response of the four daily newspapers of Portland, the Chamber of Commerce, banks, and other business interests of Portland, there is every indication that the Pacific International horse show, to be held in connection with the Pacific International Livestock Exposition next November, will be the largest and best ever held here.

A total of \$40,000 has been provided for the stakes, and plans are in course of preparation to expand the horse show, obtain more entries and to interest more people than ever in this feature. It is believed by A. C. Ruby, President of the Exposition, and his associates that there are practically unlimited possibilities in building up the horse show feature.

Hunting Licenses Issued in U. S.

During the season 1926-27 more than 5,750,000 hunting licenses for the taking of wild game were issued to sportsmen throughout the United States, including Alaska, and the revenue to the States amounted to more than \$7,800,000. Although data from four States are lacking, detailed figures for the season compiled by the Bureau of Biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture show increases in number of licenses issued and fees received over the preceding years. In the 1923-24 season, the licenses numbered 4,895,038 and the fees paid were \$5,594,982. One year later, 4,904,740 hunters paid for their licenses a total of \$6,190,863, while in 1925-26 hunting licenses to the number of 5,168,353 were issued, bringing a revenue of \$6,872,812 to the States.

For the 1926-27 season, there were issued in the state of Oregon 53,353 resident licenses, 715 to non-residents, and the money paid for combined hunting and fishing licenses amounted to \$199,916.50.

Postal Rates on Library Books

Beginning July 1st books sent from and returned to free public libraries receive a greatly decreased rate provided in a bill recently passed by Congress, and amended through the efforts of the Oregon State Library and the Oregon senators, following the Library's protest against a proposed increase. The new rate omits altogether the former service charge of two cents per package, reduces the cost of the initial pound from five and six cents to a flat rate of three cents, throughout the state. All additional pounds in the third zone will cost one cent instead of two cents each. The state thus becomes one zone for library books, which receive a preferential rate.

The State Library in 1927 sent out to its patrons 23,631 packages of books. The initial saving on these, regardless of zone and weight, would be \$1,150, which will accrue to the benefit of the country patrons of the Library, as they refund the postage charges when the books are returned. The State Library estimates a saving of from \$3,000 to \$3,500 a year to its patrons, and a great increase in the mail order use of state, county, and city libraries. Senator Steiwer gave this bill special attention in response to the requests of the trustees of Oregon state and county libraries.

NOTICE OF REPAIR OF SEWER

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Coquille did by resolution duly adopted at a meeting of said Council held on the 25th day of June, A.
