### SKAGGS SAFEWAY STORE OPENS TODAY

American Falls, Idaho, in 1915. He had come west in search of health, and had taken a homestead in Idaho. Conditions around American Falls seemed to be favorable for the opening of a new grocery store, so Mr. Skaggs secured the loan of \$1,000, with no security save his known character, and proceeded to put his plans into execution.

On a rented lot on a side street he erected with his own hands, a frame building of dimensions 18x32 feet and in this little building in the summer of 1915 was opened the first Skaggs Store of the West. In that store S. M. Skaggs toiled diligently, frequently for weeks at a time walking two and a half miles from his homestead to work and back in the evenings so that all possible horsepower could be used on the farm.

This store was the first unit in a chain, which in a little more than ten years blankets the Pacific Coast and extending as far east as Colorado and Nebraska comprises more than three hundred of the finest food stores.

S. M. Skaggs, some four years after the opening of the first store, with his health regained, returned to the geographical location of his choice and the occupation dictated by his moral conviction—that of preaching the Gospel as he understands it—but many of the methods employed by him, the founder, are still used; used with the knowledge that "He who serves best profits most," and much of the spirit imbued into the lives of the older personnel through their association with him still lives and finds expression.

### Oregon Leads in Testing

Oregon with 172 dairy herds in improvement associations for 1926-27 made the highest record of the 31 states engaged in such work according to a report received from the United States department of agriculture by N. C. Jamison, extension specialist in dairying at the state college who is in charge of the work. Of the Oregon herds in the improvement work, 66.2 per cent average above 300 pounds of butterfat a year.

Idaho was next in the list with 63.2 per cent above 300 pounds while next in order were Michigan, Ohio, West Virginia, Indiana and Nebraska. Wisconsin led the states in number of herds in the associations, having 2,904, with Michigan second. Oregon is fourteenth in this list and Georgia last.

The average for the United States of 11,370 herds in these improvement associations is 7410 pounds of 4 per cent milk per cow or 295 pounds of butterfat.

County Agent Harvey S. Hale adds to the above that Coos county, with 3,000 cows under test, ranks second to Tillamook county in the average butterfat per cow produced. Tillamook average 3.41 while the Coos record is 3.26.

In Coos county there are more cows under test than in any other county in the state. In fact, there are as many as in any other two counties for Tillamook, which stands second, has 1700 cows under test.

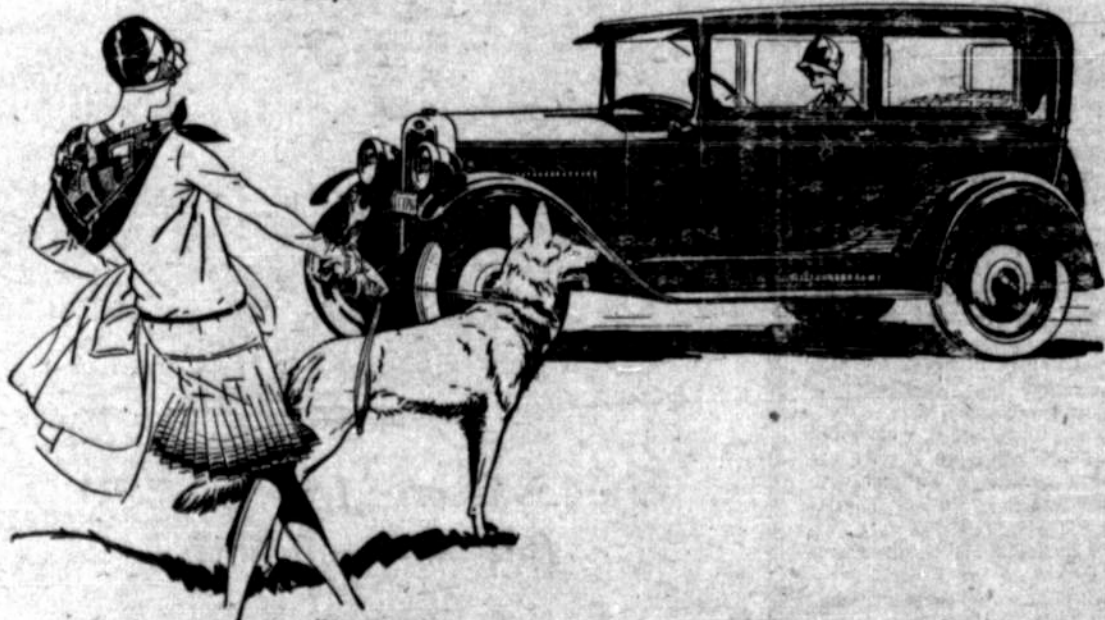
