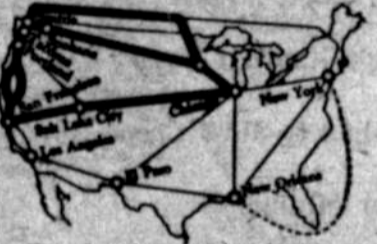

Scottish Capital Has Long Been Royal City

Edinburgh is rightly proud of its long history, but it would be difficult to say exactly when that history began. The castle rock doubtless commended itself as a desirable defensive position to the early Britons, and one may enter upon a wide field of conjecture as to why they gave it its first name of Mynd Agned; signifying the "painted mound." In what must have been a dim and misty past even to the Gaels, who later christened it Dunedin.

The oldest form of its present name was Edwinesburgh, as it is recorded in the foundation charter of Holyrood in 1128, and authentic history prior to

that date is lacking, according to a writer in the Weekly Scotsman. According to Stinson of Durham the buildings on the hill in the Ninth century, apart from the castle, constituted only a small village; and it was not till 1067 when, on the death of Malcolm Canmore, it became the place of refuge of Queen Margaret that Edinburgh emerged from obscurity.

In succeeding centuries its strategic position and its royal associations increased its importance, and David I referred to it as "men burgo de Edwinesburgh," but it was in 1229 that it was formally constituted a royal burgh by a charter, of Robert the Bruce.

Protest Failure to Oil Road (Western World)

The state highway commission is making the Coos and Curry district the goat for the annoyance caused by Senator Dunne of Multnomah county who was instrumental in getting his automobile license reduction measure on the ballot, according to the sentiment expressed at the meeting of the Bandon chamber of commerce held at Queen Anne yesterday, noon.

Because of the possibility of interruption in the state highway finances the commission has failed to start the oiling program that is necessary to preserve the surface of the Roosevelt highway in this section. As a result this part of the state remains in the dust and the surface of the highway is being worn down and destroyed.

However, it was pointed out that the oiling program was not interrupted in other parts of the state, being in progress in some of the most remote sections of southern and central Oregon.

Considerable indignation was expressed by the local chamber asking the Coos County Chamber of Commerce to take action looking to the relief that is deemed necessary.

It was the contention of speakers that any legislation that might be enacted in the future, either by direct vote of the people or by the legislature, should not affect programs that have been out-fund for more than a year and for which funds had been appropriated. The local oiling program, it was held, should have been started regardless of any agitation for changes that might become effective in the future.

WATCH INCUBATOR WHILE HATCHING

While many successful poultry growers are now buying day-old chicks for replenishing their flocks and for raising early broilers and pullets, there are still a great number of small incubators used on farms.

"Directions for operating these machines come with them," says Allen G. Oliver, poultry extension specialist at the North Carolina state college, "yet in most cases these directions apply only to the mechanical operation. We would not attempt to give specific rules that would work well under all conditions. The first hatch may be made when atmospheric conditions are ideal, resulting in an ideal hatch of strong chicks; the next hatch may give poor scrawny birds, even though the incubator ran perfectly. There are some few points to consider, however, in hatching out the early chicks this spring."

The normal time for an egg to hatch is 21 days, states Mr. Oliver. Too much heat means a hatch in about 19 days, and too little heat, in about 22 to 23 days. The temperature at the center of the eggs ought to be kept at 100 degrees. Moisture is next in importance. The amount of evaporation in the egg determines the size of the air cell at the end and the quantity of food left for the chick when it hatches. This also determines the size of the young bird. The operator of the incubator should watch the size of the air cell as the hatch progresses and add such moisture as is needed.

Ventilation is also important, states Mr. Oliver. This brings in pure oxygen and takes out the carbon dioxide. The egg is a factory with the materials in the shell as the raw product. By carefully regulating the heat and watching the size of the air cells it is possible to supply enough fresh air and the correct amount of moisture so that there will be little danger from lack of ventilation.

Turning the eggs stimulates the hatching chick to action and gives it exercise and strength.

Cold Light

When the current of a Ruhmkort induction coil is passed through a glass tube in a vacuum the tube glows with a brilliant light. This is the light of the future. Hitherto it has not been possible to produce light without producing heat. But recently an improved form of the Geister tube has been produced which has it is claimed, overcome this difficulty. The light of the future will glow through long transparent tubes of all sizes and calibers, able to take the most varied directions and to run horizontally, vertically or obliquely, forming stars, roses, spirals, arabesques, etc.

The tubes radiate a diffused glow from end to end. The effect is a splendid, intense lunar light.
