

**Coquille Leads by One Game**

Due to the effective aid of "Penny" Sturdivant, Coquille now tops the Coos County League by one full game and only has to win one of the two remaining games with Marshfield to win the 1928 championship.

After Myrtle Point had lost the first game at the Bay Sunday by an 18-2 score, "Penny" went into the box for the Pointers and in seven innings held the Marshfield team to three hits two of them sacrifice, and shut them out, 8-0. It was the first game in which the Bay squad has failed to make a score. It might further be added that Myrtle Point which has won but one game this season, has yet to be shut out.

Coquille out hit Bandon here Sunday, 10 to 7, outscored them 6 to 4, and out-errored them 1 to 8. Manager McNair was shy three of his regular team, Moore, Fasnacht and Tucker, but they played pretty good ball considering their crippled condition.

Coquille started scoring in the first. Lund singled but was thrown out at second on Roper's hit to third, after Pulford had struck out. Bill Fortier followed with a triple into deep right scoring Roper but died there.

A comedy of five errors enabled Coquille to score two in the second without a sign of a hit.

In the third Fortier reached third on another smash to right which the fielder could not reach, and scored on an error by Cardinal.

Hits by Stewart and Pulford, and two muffed flies by Selkirk allowed Coquille one run in the fourth and the sixth run was added in the eighth on four singles by Fortier, Barnes, Davis and Stewart.

Bandon scored three in the sixth when Donahy tripled over Barnes' head, after Roselle and Selkirk had singled and Cardinal had walked.

Another triple by Wigant in the eighth scored Donahy who had singled, and that was the end of the tallying.

Meiers has a wife and a small child and they have been residing on a small chicken ranch in Bay Park for the past eight months. During the war he was overseas and was gassed and has been in poor health since that time. He is a nephew of D. W. Rhodes of the City Delivery in Marshfield.
