NOTICE OF REPAIR OF SEWER

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Coquille, by resolution duly adopted at a meeting of said council held on the 25th day of June, A. D. 1928, and which resolution is kept of record in the office of the City Recorder in the records of the proceedings of the Common Council and reference to which is hereby made as a part of this notice, hereby declares its intention and purpose to repair that portion of the First Street sewer from a manhole which bears south 1 deg. 53 min. east 141.35 feet from the southwest corner of Front and Hall Streets thence south 20 deg. 38 min. west 175.9 feet, thence in a southeasterly direction to the Coquille river and within the corporate limits of the said City of Coquille.

Said repairs will be made in accordance with the plans and specifications of the City Engineer filed in the office of said Recorder on the 13th day of June, A. D. 1928, and the estimate of the probable cost of said improvement is the sum of \$1,844.40 for concrete pipe and \$1,896.50 for vitrified pipe.

Said improvements will be made at the cost and expense of the property benefited thereby as stated in said resolution.

Any and all persons interested may make and file with the City Recorder a written objection to or remonstrance against said improvement within twenty days from the first publication of this notice, to-wit, within twenty days from the 20th day of July, A. D. 1928.

Coos Students at O. A. C.

Coos county had 69 students among the 3818 total long term students last year at the Oregon State Agricultural college, according to a detailed report of the year's registration just issued by E. B. Lemon, registrar. Total enrollment for the year including summer session and other specially classified students reached a high mark of 5311 as compared with 5087 the year previous.

This county also has 7 regular students in the 1928 summer session which has enrolled 707 regular students and a total of 1385 including the junior summer session. For the year 1927-28 students were enrolled from five foreign countries—Canada, China, India, Korea and Russia; three territories—Alaska, Hawaii and the Philippines; the District of Columbia, 25 states beside every county in Oregon.

Special railroad rates from all points in the United States for members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the U. S. planning to attend the 29th National Encampment to be held at Indianapolis, August 26 to 31, have been announced.

The regular one-way fare to Indianapolis will secure round trip transportation for all V. F. W. and Auxiliary delegates and members upon display of credentials at railroad ticket offices. Credentials are being distributed through post commanders to be given out to members upon due application.

The Indianapolis encampment will mark the passing of twenty-nine years since the organization was formed in Denver by General Irving Hale, of Denver, hero of the Philippines, who is still living.

New Roof Is Worth It.

Thos. Michelson paid a fine of \$45 in Recorder Leslie's court Wednesday afternoon for repairing the building, where his confectionery is located, without a permit from the city council. The repair work consisted of putting a new rubberoid covering on one section of the roof to stop the leaks, and a few new boards in the entrance where the floor was rotting away.

Mr. Michelson pleaded not guilty to the charge, but admitted he had employed Harry Ross to make the repairs. The recorder fined him three times the amount of the admitted cost of repair.

There was an opportunity here to test out the city ordinance which forbids repairs on old buildings within the fire limits without the sanction of the council, but Mr. Michelson gave no notice of appeal.
