NOTICE OF REPAIR OF SEWER

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Coquille did by resolution duly adopted at a meeting of said council held on the 25th day of June, A. D. 1928, and which resolution is kept of record in the office of the City Recorder in the records of the proceedings of the Common Council and reference to which is hereby made as a part of this notice, duly declare its intention and purpose to repair that portion of the First Street sewer from a manhole which bears south 1 deg. 53 min. east 141.35 feet from the southwest corner of Front and Hall Streets, thence south 20 deg. 38 min. west 175.9 feet, thence in a southeasterly direction to the Coquille river, and within the corporate limits of the said City of Coquille.

Said repairs will be made in accordance with the plans and specifications of the City Engineer filed in the office of said Recorder on the 13th day of June, A. D. 1928, and the estimate of the probable cost of said improvement is the sum of \$1,844.40 for concrete pipe and \$1,896.50 for vitrified pipe.

Said improvements will be made at the cost and expense of the property benefited thereby as stated in said resolution.

Any and all persons interested may make and file with the City Recorder a written objection to or remonstrance against said improvement within twenty days from the first publication of this notice, to-wit, within twenty days from the 20th day of July, A. D. 1928.
