



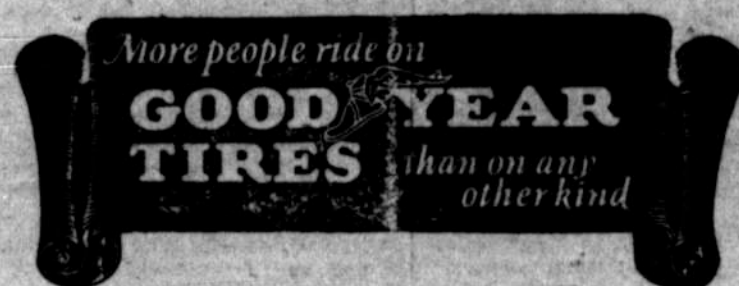

Henry Horstman Dies

Henry Horstman, 67, one of North Bend's oldest citizens, passed away Wednesday afternoon, a victim of heart trouble. Mr. Horstman died at the Martin hotel, where he had been staying. He had been suffering from attacks during the past three months and at frequent intervals had been confined at the Mercy hospital.

He was born in Germany in 1861, and has made his home in North Bend for more than 18 years. He leaves only one survivor, his daughter, Mrs. B. M. Abinanti, of San Francisco. His divorced wife is also in San Francisco. His daughter was notified and word was received that she was

leaving for North Bend.

Six years ago Mr. Horstman started the North Bend Myrtlewood Novelty shop located on North Sherman avenue. All his life Mr. Horstman's trade had been that of a myrtle wood turner, and he was known as the oldest and best myrtle wood turner on the coast—Times.

Five More Plead Guilty

Game Warden Clint Hearing is now well ahead of his one conviction a week, five having plead guilty before Justice E. A. Dodge at Myrtle Point since Saturday to game law violations.

Hugo Reiher, Gordon Sanford and Geo. Sanford, who live on North Slough, were arrested last Friday for possession of venison. The first two were fined \$100 each and costs and the latter \$50 and costs.

It required considerable deduction and running around to get all the evidence Mr. Hearing needed, but he finally unearthed the venison where the men had it hidden. Blood stains on their backs and their suspicious actions led to their arrest, although the game warden was looking for violators at the time.

George Flanagan and Stanley Oldland were arrested on Tuesday charged with possession of deer meat during the closed season. They were fined \$100 and \$50 respectively.

The deer season does not open until Sept. 10, and hunters at that time should have their licenses with them as the wardens will be actively on the job.

There is no law forbidding a person fishing or hunting on his own premises, but in the case of killing a deer the tag must be immediately attached. It would render a hunter liable to fine, even though he had not been off his own ranch, if the warden happened to learn of it and he had no license tag.
