Port of Bandon Budget

The budget committee of the Port of Bandon met in the city hall here Tuesday morning and adopted a proposed budget for next year. It contemplates an expenditure of \$31,760 next year, of which \$12,760 is to be raised by taxation. One item is for \$12,500 for the retirement of bonds, time warrants and interest. It is proposed to use \$5,000 of it for retiring warrants and \$5,000 will go into a sinking fund for bond retirement.

In the afternoon a joint meeting with the commission of logging operators and farmers of the Coquille valley was scheduled to be held but H. E. Hess was the only rancher present. Several of the loggers were in attendance.

The purpose of the meeting was for the discussion of Ordinance 23, passed last month, which provides penalty, among other things, for blocking the river with logs. The land owners claim this holds the water back during a freshet and causes the cutting of banks and damage to their land.

The loggers advance as their argument that if the logs, during high water, pass below their holding station above Fishtrap that many of them float to sea; that it is an unnecessary expense to capture and boom them and bring them back from the lower river, and that many of the operators are financially embarrassed if the return of logs up river is delayed until the freshets subside.

The port commission desires to fulfill its duties by obeying the wish of the people and the problem is to find a satisfactory solution which will be fair to both farmers and loggers. When boats were running, blocking the river was not attempted but the stretching of cables across the river last year was a serious damage to land along the river, on the opposite side and up stream.
