#### Bancorporation Dividend

The Pacific Bancorporation, organized last July, has declared a cash dividend at the rate of \$3.75 per share per annum on both preferred and common stock, payable as of January 1, 1936, according to Charles Hall, president. Books for transfer of stock will close December 20. Checks will be mailed thereafter as the clerical work can be accomplished.

The dividend represents a return of, slightly less than six per cent on stock investment in the corporation, according to company officials. It is announced that future dividends will be paid on a quarterly basis.

"This dividend is made possible by the earnings of the bancorporation," said Mr. Hall, "and reflects indirectly the gratifying returns from member banks and the prosperity of the communities in which they are located."

Pacific Bancorporation now owns or controls ten banks in the state with resources in excess of \$10,000,000. The member banks are: Portland National Bank, United States National Bank of Eugene, and the Eugene Loan and Savings Bank, the Bank of Commerce, Astoria; the First National Bank, Silverton; the Farmers and Merchants Bank, Coquille; Bank of Myrtle Point; the American Bank, Marshfield; the First National Bank, Gardiner; and the Chiloquin State Bank. The corporation also owns the Klamath Heating company, a public utility at Klamath Falls.

The Gardiner bank recently declared its second 10 per cent dividend for the year.

#### Remain at Home
