"Better Teeth" Campaign On

A campaign for better teeth in the mouths of Coos county children is now being conducted by the County Health Department, assisted by the dentists of the county who are making the surveys.

To stimulate a greater interest on the part of the children, and through them their parents, contests are now being waged between many schools in the county. Between the Myrtle Point and Bandon schools a \$5 prize has been offered for the largest percentage of mouths put in perfect condition by the correction of teeth defects, and this has been increased by a \$5 prize offered by the Bandon - Lions Club.

In Coquille the contest is between the Lincoln and Washington buildings. Eastside and Bunker Hill schools are two more paired in a contest, while at Flagstaff the contest is between rooms.

The contests end with the present semester, but it is hoped others will be started. A button suitably marked, is presented to each child whose mouth is in perfect condition.

According to the county health nurses, poor teeth are the most outstanding of all the physical defects of Coos county children.

Swift Executive Dies

C. T. Selbig received word this week of the death of H. B. Collins, manager of the Produce Department of Swift & Co., which occurred in Paris, December 1. Mr. Collins was in Coquille a year ago when the local creamery was taken over after its purchase from J. H. McCloskey. He had expected to be here for the banquet tendered by the company to the Chamber of Commerce here early this year, but he was unable to be present.

A letter from an executive of the national organization of butter manufacturers expresses the opinion in which he was held by associates:

"In Mr. Collins we have lost a great leader, who, during his career, was a powerful and effective executive as manager of the Produce Department of Swift & Company, which includes the largest system of creameries in the United States.

"Mr. Collins was a kind and courteous man, who had a great many friends."

Laying Pipe to New Plant

The four-inch pipe which arrived last week was being laid this week by Water Superintendent Epperson and a crew of men down Knowlton avenue from the main pipe line near the Willey home. The line will be extended across the E. A. Folsom and Chenoweth places and the highway, to the Smith cut-up plant and the Union Oil Co. sub-station.

Fire hydrants will be installed at the Chas. Baxter corner and at the Smith plant.

It is not expected that the 30-foot extension for the suction pipe in the new well will be received until after the first of the year, when it is hoped to give the well a thorough test.
