

**Coquille Flower Lovers Club Notes**

The Flower Lovers Club held its regular meeting at the city hall on Tuesday evening with a very large attendance.

Ira N. Gabrielson, state rodent expert, gave a good and very interesting talk on the extermination of the mole. He told how to set traps and then showed the best kind of a trap to use. He also gave a life history of the mole. All enjoyed his talk very much.

Mr. Roy Woodruff, of Eugene, one of the largest growers of shrubs and ornamental trees in Oregon, was present. His firm also has a landscape department. Mr. Woodruff gave a very instructive talk on the use of

ornamentals in all base plantings around the home. He also pointed out the many mistakes made in planting the wrong kinds of shrubs in places which in after years were eyesores and that much time and money was so wasted. He also showed how it was best to have someone who understands the business to lay the ground out before planting. He also told how the planting should be taken care of and pruned. He also brought out many points of interest that, if followed, would result in much finer border and base plantings.

A short talk was also given by another nurseryman, Mr. Moyes, of Roseburg. He spoke about the planting of shade trees and the selection of trees for street planting. He told how much beauty had been added to the city of Roseburg by the use of good shade trees and shrubbery.

There was present a representative of The Oregon Gardens of Portland, who gave one of the best talks on rock gardens and everything for the rock garden that the writer has heard

in many years. He went into the details of construction and maintenance of the many types of rock gardens. He also told of the many varieties of plants suited for rock gardens. He gave a brief history of some of the new plants that have been introduced in the last few years and brought out many other points of interest to the man or woman who intends to build a rock garden.

The next meeting of the club will be held January 8th and at that meeting papers will be read by Mrs. George Leach, Mrs. Belle Gould and Mrs. Bertha J. Smith. These papers will be of much interest to all members and it is hoped there will be a large attendance at this meeting. At the January 22 meeting there will be papers read by Mrs. Florence Sanford and J. L. Stevens and Mrs. Wm. Candlin. These papers will be of much interest as they will be on many new subjects and it is hoped that all members will attend and bring at least one new member apiece.

The number of members on the roll

at the last meeting was 168 and it is desired by the first of the new year to have 200 or more. During the coming year there will be more permanent plantings made than has ever been done in the history of Coquille.

The treatment of bulbs after flowering is important where the same bulbs are to be used again, for it must never be forgotten that the flowers and resources for the next season are garnered within the bulb after blooming through the agency of the roots and foliage. Imperfectly developed and matured foliage this year means poor flowers or none at all next year; so it is best to leave the bulbs alone until the leaves have died down. When summer bedding plants are to be substituted, it is sometimes necessary to remove bulbs before they are ripe, in such cases they should be carefully taken up with a spade, disturbing the roots as little as possible. Do not cut nor crush the leaves and "heel in" the plants in a shallow trench in some semi-shady out-of-the-way place until ripe.

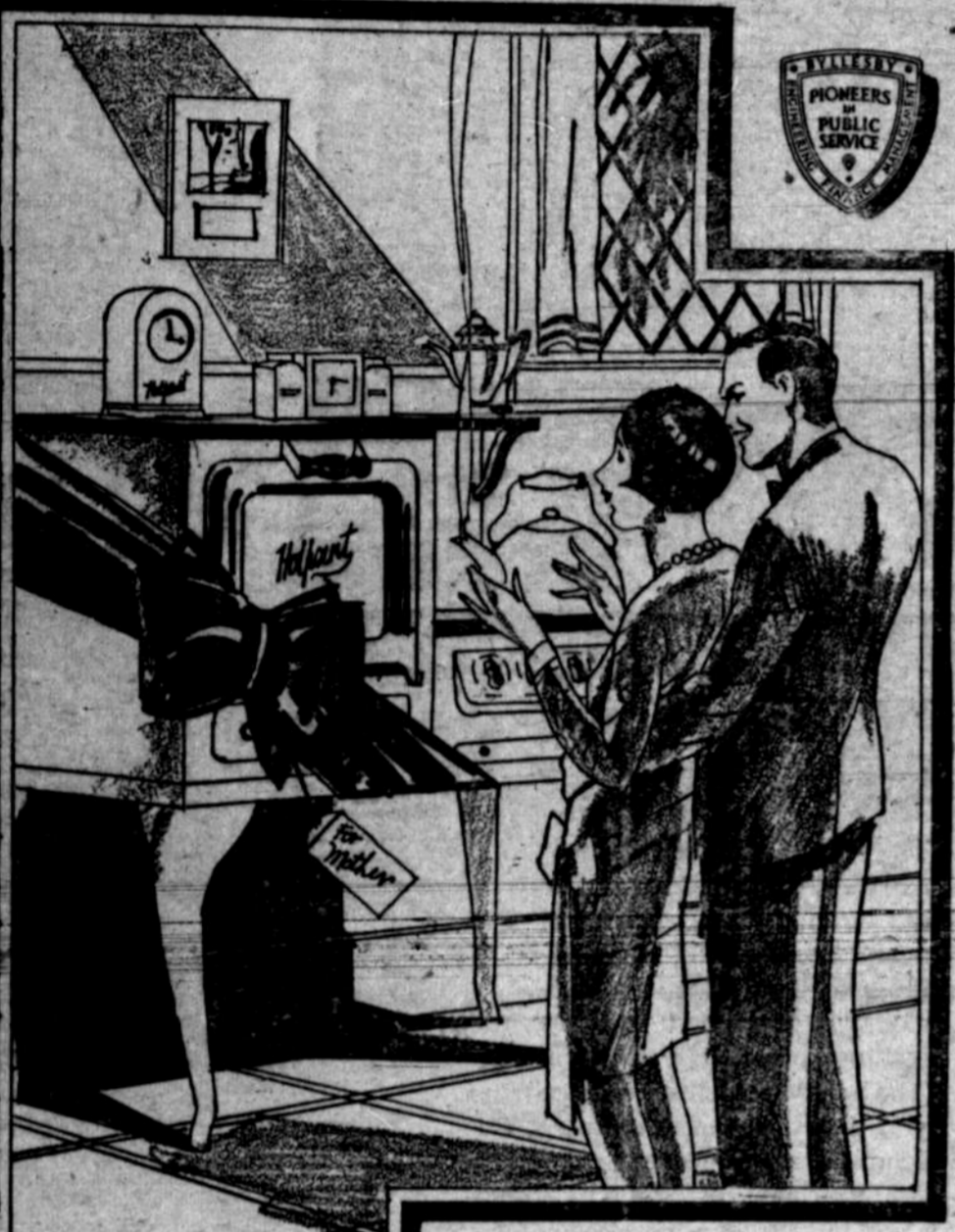

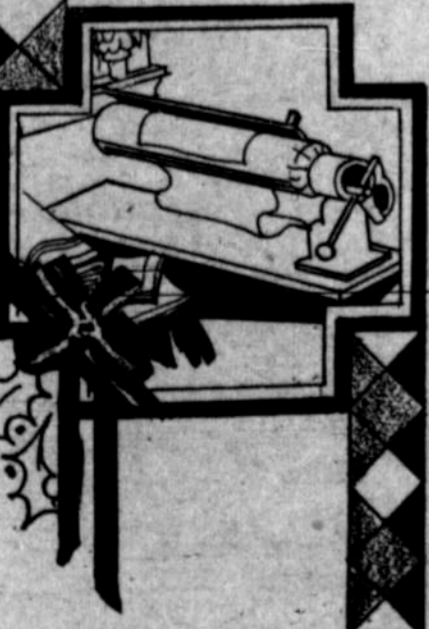
