Last Session of Old Court

In an order declaring the urgent necessity of surfacing the Bald Hill road, on the north side of the North Fork, from Cooper Bridge to the highway, the county court this week set aside \$9,000, from market road funds for this purpose. The decayed condition of the approaches to Cooper bridge is mentioned as a condition which necessitates prompt action.

Sums set aside for other market roads included the following: M. P.-Sitkum \$500; Norway-Lee-

Fairview 500; North Coos River \$200; M. P.-Lampa \$320; North Bank \$200; Coos River-Daniels Creek \$400; North Bend-South Slough \$1,000; Bear Creek \$150; Upper Two Mile \$100; Lee-McKinley \$400; Shuttlers Creek-Templeton \$200; Haynes Slough \$200; Larson Slough \$300; Catching Creek \$500; Hoffman Bridge-Powers \$500; Fishtrap Landing \$200; Catching Slough \$200; Fox Bridge-Gravel Ford \$200; Lundgren road \$200.

Bids were called for the operation of the Riverton and Bullards ferries for the year 1929.

The new front engine hanger does away with all body roar. It consists of three springs which cushion the motor. It can be installed for eight dollars on the older cars.

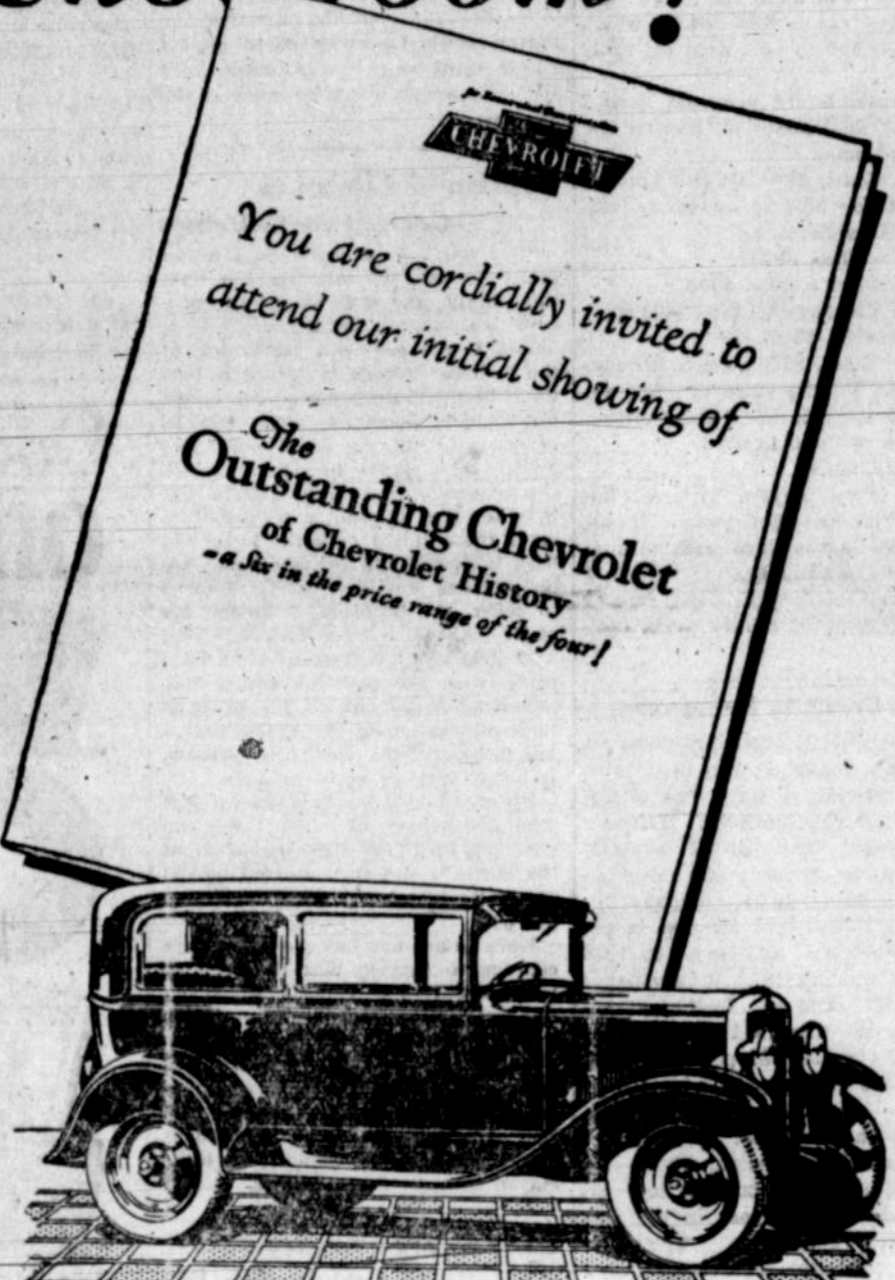

Best Sort of Success

When Pasteurization Fails

The value of the pasteurization process as applied to milk has been questioned from time to time and it is undoubtedly true that for one reason or another, the operation does not always seem to be entirely satisfactory in the results. Somewhat recently it has been discovered that milk left uncooled between milking and pasteurization for a period of about four hours contains a large percentage of organisms that resist the pasteurizing process, while milk cooled and held to below 50 degrees Fahrenheit until it reaches the pasteurizer contains relatively few of these heat-resisting organisms.
