**Hall President of Eugene Banks**

Senator Charles Hall, president of the Pacific Bancorporation, became president of the United States National Bank of Eugene, and of the Eugene Loan and Savings Bank, at the annual election held yesterday, in accordance with the decision of the executive committee of the Bancorporation.

Mr. Hall succeeds W. W. Calkins, who became chairman of the board of the two banks.

G. S. Hinsdale, vice president of the First National Bank of Gardiner, became a vice president of the Eugene institutions, and H. L. Edmunds, vice president and cashier of the Gardiner bank, is cashier of both Eugene banks. They will retain their connection with the Gardiner bank but will live in Eugene.

At the same time Senator Hall will retire as president of the American Bank at Marshfield, and will be succeeded there by W. U. Douglas, Marshfield attorney, well-known in banking circles.

In announcing the changes at Eugene the executive committee said it was deemed particularly desirable to have Senator Hall in active direction of the Eugene banks because of their central location in relation to other Bancorporation member banks. Other than as stated the vice presidents and junior officers of the Eugene institutions will remain as at present.

The change probably presages Senator Hall's taking up his residence in Eugene although such announcement was not made.
