The Ford Motor Co. manufactured the old model T Ford Car for eighteen years. A total of fifteen million cars were made and sold in that time. The new model A Ford car was announced and displayed to the public about one year ago. About seven hundred thousand have been delivered since then, most of them in the last four months. Production is now at the rate of about seven thousand cars a day.

Ford is adhering to his old policy with the new model. Mechanical improvements in the chassis are so designed that they are interchangeable with the older parts. For instance the starter and the front engine

hanger have been changed lately. The new starter can be installed on the first models at a cost to the owner of four dollars and fifty cents. The new front engine hanger does away with all body roar. It consists of three springs which cushion the motor. It can be installed for eight dollars on the older cars.

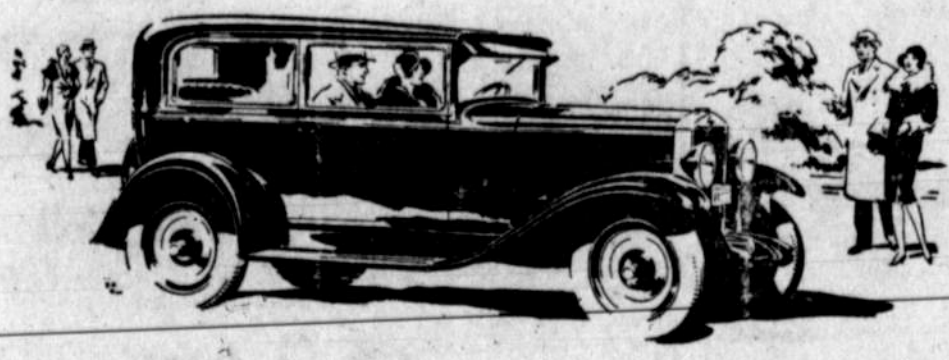
