Plan Now for a Garden

To enjoy flowers all through the seasons—in other words succession of bloom in the garden—plans must be made long in advance. The winter season or when we are indoors, is the ideal time to carefully consider what our garden lacked in the past season and how to make it more beautiful in the season to come.

The first step is to make a chart of the grounds. Sketch in all buildings, walks, trees and growing shrubs and what flower borders that are already fixed. The kind of soil should next be considered and matter of light and shade. The garden beginner should study good gardens in the neighborhood, send for the best catalogues available and study authoritative garden books.

Annuals bloom most quickly and are always used among shrubs and in borders. Sweet Alyssum, Blue Lobelia, blue Aquatum and Candytuft make splendid edgings, are low growing and bloom until late in the fall. Taller growing ones for center of bed are Clarkia, Larkspur, Poppies, French Marigolds, Petunias, Salpiglossis, Snapdragons, Gaillardia, Godetia, Zinnias, Cosmos, Asters, Stock and Calliopsis.

For the back of the border, hollyhocks now in annual and biennial varieties, Michaelmas (aster) daisies, the new reds in the sunflowers, nicotiana.

The perennials take more time to be raised but are known as "the aristocrats of the garden." It is well to start them early in the season, use plenty of annuals to fill out the first year, letting the hardy plants have

their necessary room the second year. Among the highly favored perennials for edgings are English Primrose, lovely new Viola (Jersey Gem) and Coral Bells.

Columbine, Phlox, Coreopsis, Penonies, Shasta Daisies, Montbretias, Sweet William, Garden Chrysanthemums, are all of medium height and will give a succession of bloom up into November.

A few of the tall perennials are Delphiniums originating in France and England which must be seen to be appreciated and are well worth all they cost. Others are Foxgloves, Golden Glow and shrubs can be used very well for the background or screen to make the picture. Iris will stand partial shade and vary in height and seasons of blooming up to the Japanese iris of July.

Lack of space will not permit me to go into detail on roses, from climbers to bushes with all their innumerable shades. But wherever they are, they need good, rich, well drained soil and plenty of sun. Dwarf Polyantha roses are desirable for planting in masses or edging borders.

Flowering shrubs, both evergreen and deciduous will be taken up later. And bulbs are indispensable in any garden as well as gladiolus and dahlias.

"An average of 150 eggs a year" is a good "resolution" for the farm poultry raiser for 1929. Some of the most important things to keep in mind to improve the flock are to use male birds bred for egg production, to select the best hens for breeding, to hatch early, and to cull the laying flock, suggests the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Better rations would increase egg production on many farms. A mash containing meat feed or the use of milk in the ration is essential to good egg production in winter.
