

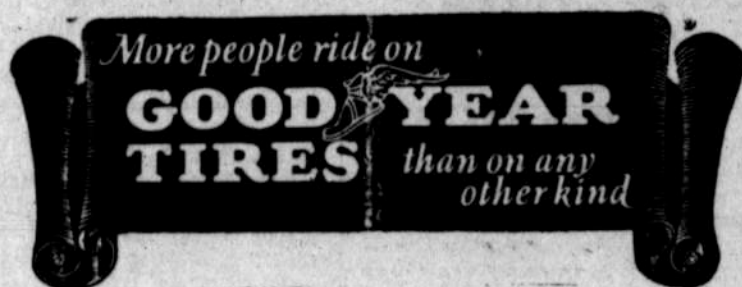


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MYRTLE POINT ITEMS

For Uniform Dairy Regulation

Salem, Jan. 22. Is it necessary to impose upon all dairymen of the state the same regulations regarding sale and distribution of milk as upon those serving Portland and other cities? This and the possible effect upon small producers is the issue which will come before the legislature when a bill intended to establish uniform regulations on the sale and distribution of milk and cream is introduced into the house by the House committee on Food and Dairy Products.

The bill was prepared by J. D. Mickle, food and dairy commissioner, who believes that some form of uniform regulation is necessary to the health of the state.

The proposed bill standardizes the quality of milk and cream by specifying the minimum fat content and the maximum of impurities allowable.

Adulteration of milk and cream is defined and penalties provided for the sale and purchase of the same.

The processes of Pasteurization are also carefully described and standardized.

All equipment necessary to the production and marketing of milk and cream must meet with certain standards. Objection was raised at this point in the preliminary hearing.

There was some question as to whether the cost of following regulations would not be prohibitive to the small producer.

Representative B. F. Swope replied to this objection that regulation was not for rich or poor, but to protect health.

The bill provides that the Food and Dairy Commissioner shall have the power to supervise and enforce the act if passed.

Tournament for Small H. S.

The Southern Oregon Normal at Ashland is again planning to hold a basketball tournament at the close of the scheduled season.

High schools of less than 100 are eligible to enter and the tournament will be held this year on March 15 and 16.

Cos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, Kamath and Lake county schools are included in the invitation.

Powers won the championship at Ashland last spring, and on the form it has shown this winter Cos River should be a good prospect for honors this year if that school enters its team.

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Ford Loses Wheel to Nash

A new Ford sedan from Oakland, Ore., had its right rear wheel smashed in a collision with a Nash touring car from Gaylord about 4:45 Sunday afternoon, at the Front and Taylor intersection here.

The Ford, driven by E. L. Settle, was turning east at the Farmers & Merchants Bank corner, and had the right of way over the Nash, driven by Oscar Neimo, but Settle had cut over past the middle of the street in making the turn, and was held responsible by Marshal Brown.

He turned the case over to Deputy Sheriff Osmond, in the absence of Traffic Officer Williams. The Ford also suffered mashed fenders.

The Nash was damaged but slightly.

Two Coyotes Brought In
